**Labor Leader Charged With Fraud.**  
Boston, Mass., July 19.—Robert P. Neil, president of the International Brotherhood of Railway Employees and well known in labor circles throughout this country and Canada, was given a preliminary hearing before United States Commissioner Hayes today on a charge of using the mails in a scheme to defraud. It is alleged that some months ago Neil issued circulars soliciting advertising for a magazine, the proceeds of which were to be used for death and sick benefits for rail road men, and that the funds received were diverted to Neil's own use.

**Corporation Officials to Be Punished.**  
Washington, July 19.—Facilitation of punishment of officials of corporations which have been convicted of breaking the law, is the design of an amendment to the Sherman anti-trust bill introduced in the house today by Congressman Small of North Carolina. The amendment makes the conviction of such corporations presumptive evidence of the controlling officials' guilt, and imprisonment is the mandatory punishment.

**WAPPENSTEIN SENTENCED.**  
Walla Walla Institution to Get Former Chief of Police.

Seattle, July 9.—Charles W. Wap-penstein, former chief of police, who was convicted of receiving a \$1,000 bribe from Gibbon Tupper and Clarence Gerald, as protection for houses of ill fame, was sentenced by Judge Ronald today to not less than three nor more than ten years at hard labor in the penitentiary.

**Auto Kills Two.**  
Los Angeles July 19.—Alexander Alk-man, a cafe proprietor and John Sum-mers of the Pacific Biscuit company, were instantly killed and Alkman's two children severely injured near Puente today when an automobile turned turtle.

## GARDEN CITY MERCHANT HERE

RES OVERLAND FROM LEHMAN HOT SPRINGS

Well Known Walla Walla Man on a Pleasure Trip.

Thomas Eastman for 35 years one of the leading merchants of Walla Walla, now retired, has been spending two days in La Grande. Mr. Eastman is out on a pleasure trip, having driven over the Blue mountains from Lehman Hot Springs by way of Starkey.

No merchant of the inland empire has a more general or more favorable acquaintance than Thomas Eastman. He knows by name nearly every man, woman and child in the Walla Walla country. He is known personally by all residents of the Garden City as well as by nearly all merchants and bankers of the other towns of the inland empire. For the many years he was in business for himself and during the long period of time that he was manager for the Schwabacker company Thomas Eastman is said never have done anything but what would be the closest investigation of contentious critics. Two years ago he retired from active commercial business and he now amuses himself by developing his large wheat farms and training his fine horses. A few days ago he left Walla Walla by horse and cart to make a

drive through the Blue mountains region, in order to keep abreast with the development of the towns and farming country.

Mr. Eastman criticises the wagon road between the summit of the Blue mountains and La Grande. He says that the individual who induced him to put his coach horse over that "mountain boulevard fit for automobiles" must belong to the Ananias club and that he will not think of him kindly. By fast walking his horse traversed the road in one day—40 miles, but arrived at La Grande somewhat stiffened up from sliding along over boulders.

Mr. Eastman speaks well of Lehman Hot Springs as a mountain resort with good prospects. But he says that Union county will have to do some road work before the springs are easily accessible by the direct route over Starkey.

Mr. Eastman will rest up several days in and near La Grande and will then return to Walla Walla via Elgin, the Looking Glass and Bones Springs Trail, a route with which he is more or less familiar.

Mr. Eastman has visited the Grande Ronde valley in 5- and 10-year periods. He says that he notices more rapid progress in the last 5-year period than at any other time in the history of this valley.

### Hammond Praises London.

New York, July 19.—Praising British hospitality, John Hays Hammond, special American ambassador to the coronation, returned here today on the Olympia. The envoy said everywhere in England expressions of the utmost friendship for America were expressed.

## SAVOY OFFICE IS RELOCATED

NET ADDITION NOT ENTIRELY COMPLETED.

Office Now on Ground Floor and Rooms Will Be Increased.

D. C. Brichoux today moved the office of the Savoy hotel to the new quarters on the ground floor in the building adjoining. The extent of the repairs, renovations and enlargements is such that it is not all completed yet but sufficient has been done to move the office from the upstairs floor to the ground floor in the wing to the building proper. The space formerly occupied by the office and lobby will be converted into a ladies' parlor and a stairway, the same as formerly used, will lead from the new office to the halls and corridors of the hotel proper. The new addition is not finished, but when it is it will add materially to the room space in the popular hotel.

### 300 New Peers to Be Created.

London, July 19.—It was learned today that the list of new peers who creation is intended to force the As-quith government's veto bill through the house of lords has been completed. Three hundred barons (to be) are on the list and the way in which each will vote is said to be fully ascertained by the government.

## LEAGUE CALLED FOR JULY 25TH

UNION AND WALLOWA COUNTIES TO SEND DELEGATES.

Meeting Postponed by Request—Vote to Hold it Here.

July 25th at 1 o'clock is the hour set for the meeting of Wallowa and Union county representatives of commercial clubs to organize a two-county publicity league. The clubs, of which there are many in these two counties, have voted, so far as recorded, to hold the meeting in La Grande, the central point and by request the meeting has been postponed from the 20th to the 25th. The meeting will be held in the Commercial club rooms commencing at 1 o'clock and at that time the two counties will decide on what line of publicity to pursue.

### Meeting of Canadian Clubs.

Winnipeg, Man., July 18.—The Association of Canadian Clubs began its third annual convention in this city as the guest of the Winnipeg Canadian club. Considerable business is to be transacted during the two days session, though much of the time will be given up to the entertainment of the visitors. The latter include delegates from 26 clubs representing nearly all the principal cities of Canada from Halifax to Vancouver.
