of facilitating the labors of the 15 councilmen.

At its meeting next Tuesday night the committee will also decide finally on the number of commissioners the new charter shall provide for, their salaries and the number of departments into which the city government shall be divided. At a former meeting of the committee it was agreed tentatively that the commission plan should embrace six commissioners and a mayor. A majority of the committee last night clearly favored a commission of only five members, one of whom should be elected mayor from among their number.

Large Salaries Favored.

Sentiment among the members of the committee favors good salaries for the commissioners on the theory that only good and efficient men can be induced to serve the city when properly compensated. At the same time it was agreed by the committee that a campaign of education must be conducted to apprise the voters of the provisions of the commission charter and the reasons for remunerating the commissioners adequately. This will be done prior to the submission of the commission charter for the approval of the voters.

City Attorney Grant submitted the preliminary draft of charter provisions providing for the preferential ballot in the election of all elective city officers. By this proposed plan successful candidates for municipal office will be de-

termined from a first, second and third choice. The nomination of all candidates must be made by petition. The plan of the city attorney was referred to the committee on finance, accounts and public utilities.

Parties Are Abolished.

One of the principal provisions of this plan of nominating and electing city officers is the abolition of political parties. No candidate for office can associate his name with that of any political party.

In its preliminary report submitted last night, the committee on public safety recommended that the police and fire departments, public safety and health departments, under the proposed charter plan, be consolidated under one department and their administration given to one commissioner. Slight changes in the administration of the police department were also suggested by the committee, which was authorized to continue its work of revision.

Efforts of Mr. Lombard to arrange for semi-weekly meetings of the committee were turned down. However, it was decided to meet regularly every Tuesday night, with the understanding that the members of the committee shall apply themselves diligently to the task before them that the compilation of the charter commission can be completed by November 9, next, the required 60 days before it is to be submitted to the voters at the special election.
