PENROSE USES HIS TIME

Political Gossip From Halls of Congress—Illinois Solon Gets Gravel.

Washington, July 22.—(Special)—There is one man in the United States senate at whose door the charge of wasting time cannot be laid and that is Senator Penrose of Pennsylvania. The senator introduced a resolution the other day that brought progressive senators to their feet at the rate of about three at a time, and Vice President Sherman was obliged to indicate in what order they might be heard. Mr. Penrose advanced the common sense proposition that a day be fixed for voting upon the bill to promote reciprocal trade relations with the Dominion of Canada, and he fixed July 24th as the time for the vote and designated July 26th for the vote on the free list bill, and July 27th for a vote upon the bill to reduce the duties on wool and the manufactures of wool. According to the rules of the senate, unanimous consent is required in such case and Mr. La Follette voiced his objection to the resolution, consequently it was not considered. Mr. Penrose declares that he will support the Canadian reciprocity measure and he has called the attention of his colleagues in the senate to the fact that although the reciprocity bill has been before the senate for three weeks that with the exception of the speeches of Senators McCumber and Nelson there had been no speeches upon the measure. "We have had running debate and idle talk without accomplishing anything, as far as I know or can see," Mr. Penrose stated that he was ready, "as I have tried to be all my life to bow to the inevitable, and if the senate passes these bills I shall bow to the verdict of the only ultimate tribunal in the United States, and that is the will of the majority." He has consistently, and persistently, asked for action and some consideration of the great measures now before the senate. In the course of his remarks the other day he added: "If the president sees fit to approve or sign them, I shall feel as most of my colleagues will feel, that we have at least discharged our duty and not wasted our time in idle delay from day to day without accomplishing any result."

It has been suggested that it must have been pleasing indeed to Senator Owen, when the committee on territories after hearing the arguments relative to statehood, decided by a vote of six to three to recommend the passage of the Flood resolution which in substance and form is drafted practically along the line of the Oklahoma gentleman's filibuster of March 4th, while brought upon him the criticism of most of the reasonable people throughout the country. At that time Senator Owen unquestionably caused the delay of New Mexico into the union by coupling Arizona with the affairs of its sister territory. Now the whole subject has been so thoroughly interwoven that the democrats have accepted the proposition as originally fostered upon them last March by Senator Owen, while a good many of the republicans are giving mild acquiescence. However, it is perhaps just as well to note at this stage of the proceedings that if the Owen-Flood democratic proposition goes through both houses, that President Taft has clearly and forcibly indicated time and again that he has a veto up his sleeve and if the democrats in both branches are at all sincere in their declarations of friendliness for the people of Arizona and New Mexico, it would appear consistent that they should amend their statehood program in such a way as to meet the views of the president who has unalterably declared that he will not sign any document endorsing the recall provision of judges, as expressed in the Arizona document.

Representative Pepper, democratic congressman from Iowa, is said to have "started something" when he began a few weeks ago to send out inquiries to his democratic friends in the Hawkeye state asking their opinions as to a probable nominee for president in 1912. The result has been exceedingly gratifying to the friends of Speaker Champ Clark, as most of the expressions that have been received have favored the candidacy of the gentleman from Missouri. And if there ever was a man who was dying to be president—and who perhaps will die of disappointment if he does not attain his ambition—it is Champ Clark. In the poll made by Mr. Pepper, it de-

velops that nobody but Clark and Woodrow Wilson have a look in so far as Iowa is concerned.

The committee of the senate having in charge the hearings for statehood in Arizona and New Mexico, have by a vote of six to three recommended concurrence in the Flood resolution which came over from the house, and which previous to its passage in that body, had the K. of the democratic caucus. Just at the present time Canadian reciprocity has the right of way, while the farmers' free list and the wool tariff measure are securing the principal attention of the law makers of the senate, and therefore there is little to be added to the story involving patient waiting on the part of the people of Arizona and New Mexico. Recent expressions on the part of the president and Attorney General Wickersham appear to confirm, beyond all doubt the fears of republican leaders who have interested themselves most in this subject, that the passage of the statehood measure for Arizona containing a provision for the recall of judges will draw a veto from the president. The New Mexico and Arizona citizens who have been here found that their suggestions for different amendments desired by them, have proven of no avail, and the only solace or crumb of comfort that has been gathered by anyone have been the amendments made by the democratic committee of the house at the suggestion of their party in New Mexico. There is reason to believe that the democratic law makers in control of the situation, aided by the progressives, are attempting to get whatever they can of party advantage out of the situation.

If ever a congressman has been grilled, that man was Representative Fowler of Illinois. Mr. Mann held him up to the ridicule of the members one day recently, by showing that he had injected into his speech, while writing and before delivering it, such expressions as "applause," "handclapping," etc. The republican leader showed how Mr. Fowler in fixing his address used the expressions, "Jesus was born in the manger," and "John the Baptist lived on locusts and wild honey." These statements, according to the Record, created "applause." Mr. Fowler attempted to defend himself, but unsuccessfully, because Mr. Mann described the speech, saying that he had examined the original manuscript and found that it was "fixed up previous to being delivered." In his description Mr. Mann said that "it was on yellow paper." Mr. Fowler asked: "And the gentleman says all he knew about it is that there was a manuscript in yellow?" The democratic side of the house thought this was the proper place to applaud, and encouraged their embarrassed colleague, but they did not continue the handclapping after Mr. Mann's retort: "No, that is not all I know about about it—after all, the principal part of the speech was the yellow paper."

Mr. Prouty of Iowa got down into the human essence of things in his remarks concerning the election of senators by the people, and he stated the question of difference between republicans and democrats as raised entirely on the point of issue as to whether the federal government should have power to preserve its own existence. Turning to the democratic side he remarked "You gentlemen from the south seem to be extremely nervous for some reason. Why is it. Do you contemplate doing something that is wrong? I want to say to you that I am northern born and northern bred and I know that these people contemplate no wrong toward you or your people. So long as you attempt to elect a man to the United States senate from the south fairly you will not be interfered with by the north. I want to say with equal candor, if you have in your minds the contemplation of the election of United States senators by methods that are unfair and unpatriotic the north wishes to reserve in its constitution sufficient power to interfere and secure for your people fair elections, if you are either unable or unwilling to secure them for yourselves."

In opposition to the proposal to reduce the duties on wools and manufactures of wool, Delegate Cameron of

Arizona pointed out in the course of his speech the fact that Arizona, one of our smallest wards, possessed a sheep population of about one million. He called attention to the fact that there are approximately 67,000,000 sheep in the United States and upon that basis the due proportion was contained in the territory which he represents. However, he directed attention to the fact that there were more sheep than people in Arizona while in the rest of the country the condition was reversed.
