**MEACHAM MILL CLOSED.**

Disjointed Condition of Market Closes Meacham Mill Last Week.

The Pendleton East Oregonian says: On account of the demoralization of the lumber market, the Meacham sawmill has discontinued operations and will remain closed down indefinitely. Manager Nibley gave the order to cease cutting on Wednesday and that night the entire crew was laid off, many of the men taking the night train for other points.

The closing of the Meacham mill has been contemplated for some time and is in keeping with the policy of many of the big milling companies throughout the northwest owing to the conditions of the lumber market. Manager Nibley declares that never in the past 20 years has he ever seen the market more "shot to pieces" than it is at present and he attributes the tariff agitation as the one and only cause. "Politicians back in Washington are responsible for the condition of the lumber market," he said, "and until they cease their agitation conditions will remain unsettled."

**Juarez, Mexico, Film.**

Juarez, (Mexico). After the Battle. This film is particularly interesting and of value from the fact that it is the first motion picture ever made of a besieged city directly after a battle. In this remarkable film the battle-scarred city of Juarez is shown as it appeared after the Mexican insurgents had succeeded in obtaining possession. You will see scenes where the most desperate fighting during the 19th century took place, showing the wreck and destruction caused by the insurgents' cannon, powerful machine guns and dynamite. Another interesting incident is a picture caught by the photographer of Red Lopez, a notorious outlaw, who was recently tried, convicted of desertion, and sentenced to be confined in prison for eight years, and shot while trying to escape. Another picturesque sight is the poorly clad insurgente army, armed to the teeth with guns and revolvers, captured from the federals. Of great interest is the church of Guadalupe, over 400 years old. Back of this church the federals made their last stand and put up an awful fight. We next see the ruined postoffice, one time home of the patriotic president, Bonito Juarez. The custom house is of historical interest to Americans as it was here that President Taft and ex-President Diaz met and dined. The first foreign territory ever visited by an American president during his term of office. The film is now running at the Isis theatre.
