**ELK ROUNDUP IN WYOMING**

**COWBOYS OF THE NORTHWEST WILL PARTICIPATE.**

First Big Roundup Soon to Commence—Will Ship Elk Out Soon.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 21.—Sportsmen and former cowboys from various parts of Eastern Washington and Central Idaho, including Edward Beck and Ray Hester, formerly of the Bank of Commerce, and Roy Hoagland of Lewiston, Idaho, have gone to Jackson's Hole, Wyo., to assist the state game wardens, United States cavalry soldiers and ranchers in rounding up between 25,000 and 30,000 elk and driving them to less settled territory. Old-timers in Spokane say that a round-up is a very difficult task at this time of the year, but the game wardens think this is the only way to save the bands from being exterminated, as the restriction of the open range has resulted in the loss of fully 2,000 animals a year by starvation, despite the fact that fodder has been provided by ranchers in the district and the legislature of the state of Wyoming. This is the first attempt at an organized round-up of elk in America and the outcome will be watched with interest by sportsmen all over the country.

This movement is the forerunner of the shipment of a consignment of elk to La Grande to be planted on the range west and near Mt. Emily, in accordance with the announcement made some time ago.

**UNCERTAINTY ABOUT ROADS**

UNION ON ALERT TO PREVENT DANGEROUS DEVELOPMENT

Not Known Whether O.-W. Controls Central or Only Co-Operating

Even Union, close as she is to the new arrangement for the installation of a motor car service between Cove and La Grande over new tracks from Union to Hot Lake, a scheme that would take Union off the railroad map it is said, does not know precisely what is going on. It is rumored from Union that the O.-W. has refused the Oregon Central the privilege of using its mainline tracks, but this is offset by the fact that construction of the new tracks and repairs of the old are still going on.

Editorially the Union Republican remarks in this connection:

There is more or less uncertainty connected with the changes being made in the Central Railroad running from Union to the O.-W. R. & N. and other valley points. One thing is certain, the piece of road between the Cove switch and Union Junction is slated for a turn-down, while there appears to be co-operation between the Central and O.-W. R. & N. companies in the construction and equipment of the road from Union to Hot Lake. The outcome will be watched with much interest and speculation as to whether the O. W. R. & N. controls the Central or is simply interested in shaping things for the removal of the station from Union Junction is rife. One thing is certain—Union may be relied upon to guard well her interest in this matter, and will not be caught napping should her welfare be jeopardized.
