OREGON DEMOS
FAVOR WILSON

SUCH IS CONCLUSION REACHED
AT HEADQUARTERS.

Union County Democrats Have Not
Expressed Opinions Yet.

Political vases in Oregon point to Woodrow Wilson as the choice of Oregon democrats, if a prognostication story published in the Portland Telegram yesterday is up to the minute. The yarn proceeds:

Woodrow Wilson, governor of New Jersey, appears to be the choice of the majority of democrats in Oregon for presidential nominee.

Reports from 17 of the 34 counties, received by State Chairman Bert E. Haney, indicate that Wilson is far in the lead of other aspirants for the party choice in this state. Chairman Haney issued a circular letter several weeks ago to the state committeemen in each county, requesting the latter to sound out the local constituency as to the party choice for president. Half of the counties have not been heard from, but the reports obtained from the remaining half show that Wilson is a red hot favorite.

Oregon is to have a preferential presidential primary next spring and wants to obtain a line on how the democrats feel in Oregon. The result is somewhat surprising, as the "peerless leader," William Jennings Bryan, is not mentioned once, although Bryan has always had many warm admirers and ardent friends in this vicinity. Governor Judson Harmon, of Ohio, is not running strong in Oregon. Neither is Champ Clark, speaker of the house of representatives, nor Joseph Folk, ex-governor of Missouri.

Twelve of the 17 counties favor Wilson; one is for Folk; one for Clark; two are for either Harmon or Wilson and another is willing to accept anyone. The report in detail as tabulated by Chairman Haney, follows:

For Wilson—Baker, Benton, Clatsop, Columbia, Harney, Hood River, Jackson, Lake, Malheur, Multnomah, Sherman and Tillamook.

For Clark—Lane.

For Clark or Folk—Clackamas.

For Harmon or Wilson—Polk and Wallawa.

For Folk, Wilson, Clark, or James J. Hill—Wasco.

Around Wasco, Hill is considered good material and is popular because of his recent penetration of the Deschutes country by railroad. Replies are expected in course of time from Coos, Curry, Crook, Douglas, Gilliam, Grant, Josephine, Klamath, Linn, Lincoln, Marion, Morrow, Umatilla, Union, Washington, Wheeler and Yamhill. If anything, reports from the outstanding counties will increase the lead attained by Wilson.

Judson Harmon's friends, however, are not idle in Oregon, despite the poor showing made in the returns of county committeemen. Prominent

democrats are acting independently of the state committee and are sounding the democratic pulse by means of letters. Some of the most astute democratic politicians in the state are quietly engineering the Harmon campaign and they are not worried over the reports of Haney.

DELEGATION THIS YEAR.

Six or Seven Headed for the U. of O.
—Other Schools Draw.

Within the next 15 days there will be an exodus of students from La Grande to larger schools of learning than exist here.

The University of Oregon will draw about seven, or possibly eight, and the other schools of the northwest will get liberal attendance from here. Will Neill, Joe Williamson and Miss Smith, undergraduates at the University of Oregon, form the veterans at the Eugene school from here, and freshmen who are contemplating matriculation at the U. are Lowell Williamson, Henry Heidenrich, Eugene Good, Addie Moon and Harold Grady. Marbel Green will likely attend Willamette and George Currey, Jr., is headed for either the University of Washington or Willamette.

Charles Reynolds will return to the O. A. C. at Corvallis early next month. Frank Ralston contemplates attending the university of Minnesota at Minneapolis or else the institution at Valparaiso.

NEW ORDINANCE USED

GREEK FINED AND LATER IS PAROLED.

Prisoner Knew Not Exact Nature of Ordinance Offense Removed.

First application of the amended ordinance as passed at a recent council meeting preventing the storage of rubbish of any sort in alleys, was given in police court this morning when Judge C. M. Humphreys fined Frank Chatas, a Greek, \$20 for piling old iron and other obnoxious articles in the alley near his place of business on Depot street. Chatas pleaded his own case, saying he had not been apprised of the new ordinance's existence and did not the material piled there was contrary to ordinance.

In view of these facts Judge Humphreys paroled the prisoner and warned him to keep refuse out of the alley hereafter or the fine would be collected.

To Pool Tobacco Crop.

Greensboro, N. C., Aug. 24.—Considerable interest is manifested in the convention to be held here tomorrow under the auspices of the North Carolina and Virginia branches of the Farmers' Co-operative and Educational union. The announced purpose of the meeting is to discuss a plan for the farmers of the two states to pool this year's tobacco crop. Charles S. Barrett, president of the national organization, and Joel B. Fort, president of the Tennessee branch, will be among the prominent speakers at the convention.

Capture of Washington.

Washington, Aug. 14.—Today saw the 97th anniversary of the capture of Washington by the British army under Gen. Ross. On the day previous the capital had been abandoned to the invaders, President Madison and other officials having fled before the approach of the red coats. A feature of the brief occupancy of the city by the invading army was the burning of a number of public buildings, including the congressional library and the many valuable historical documents it contained.

SUMPTER CASE
IS MYSTIFYING

FEW DEVELOPMENTS FOUND IN
SHOOTING THERE.

Husband of Wounded Woman Held by
Authorities.

(Baker Herald.)

That Charles Beyer, the Sumpter gardener, whose wife is in the St. Elizabeth hospital in a serious condition as the result of being mysteriously shot in the head at Sumpter yesterday, cleaned his .22 rifle most thoroughly after the shot which struck Mrs. Beyer was fired was evidence uncovered at Sumpter this morning by Sheriff Rand and District Attorney Levens. Other evidence not yet made public was also gathered, it is understood.

Beyer was arrested at the bedside of his wife in the hospital by Deputy Sheriff Herbert this afternoon. The nephew, Gus Fechner, or Beyer, as he is known in Sumpter, is under arrest and will be brought down to Baker tonight.

The officers at Sumpter made an exhaustive examination of the Beyer premises. Although a big pool of blood had formed on the floor where the woman lay in the house, there was no blood on the grass or ground outside where she was said to have been standing when the shot struck her; this in spite of the statement of the nephew that she had lain there for about 15 minutes when he found her.

These facts together with the other evidence gathered by the officers lead them to believe a deliberate murder was planned.

At the hospital this afternoon Mrs. Beyer was reported as in good condition with good prospects for recovery. Dr. Dodson this morning operated, removing the bullet which had entered the woman's right cheek just below the eye from above the right ear to which it had been deflected by the skull.

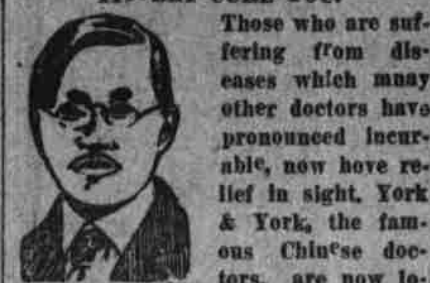
