STORAGE RATE IS OBTAINED

STORAGE IN TRANSIT RATES NOW AVAILABLE.

Northwestern Fruit Exchange Secures Rates for Clients.

(Issued by the Northwestern Fruit Exchange.)

Portland, Aug. 26.—(Special.)—The Exchange is just in receipt of advance information from the various transcontinental lines to the effect that its efforts in behalf of the growers of the entire Northwest to secure storage in transit rates, have at last met with success, and this privilege will be published to take effect as soon as it can be arranged by the interested carriers.

The Exchange has worked incessantly along broad lines to secure this privilege for the growers. It has realized it as something of growing and immediate necessity to the industry, and has therefore used its strongest efforts to the end that the concession be obtained from the railroads.

The value to the industry of permitting storage in transit of boxed apples will be readily appreciated. Owing to the perishable nature of the commodity, and the very limited time in which the entire output of the Northwest must be harvested, it became apparent to students of the marketing end of the industry that some very vital change had to be inaugurated prior to the time the industry outgrew its limited states.

You will be kept fully advised as to further progress. At the present time we can only transmit the good news to you with the understanding that the storage in transit rates will be published in time to take care of the present season's apple crop.

HILLMAN ACCUSED.

Game Warden Finds Stream Befouled by Edgings and Other Matter.

(Elgin Recorder.)

Complaint having been made that Claude Huffman, manager of the Adams & Pilgram mill, about nine miles from Elgin, on Indian creek, was throwing edgings into the creek and burning them there, the city council ordered Marshal Christiansen to visit the place and make a thorough investigation of the matter, in the interest of Elgin's water supply. Mr. Christiansen went out Tuesday afternoon, accompanied by two state game wardens, and found a very bad state of affairs existing. A forest reserve man had visited Huffman a short time previous and had instructed him to quit the practice. On their return the game warden notified District Attorney Ivanhoe at La Grande, and he immediately notified Deputy Simmons to draw the necessary papers for Huffman's arrest. Justice Barnes appointed J. C. Christiansen deputy constable and Huffman was arrested on Wednesday afternoon and brought before the justice in the evening.

Mr. Simmons, of the district attorney's office, appeared for the state, and Messrs. Denham and Dixon for the defense. The defense moved to quash on the ground that the complaint was not in proper form, in that it was sworn to in the words "verily believe" that the offense charged had been committed and, according to the decision, based on the constitution of the United States, this did not give the court jurisdiction. The district attorney asked leave to amend the complaint, but this was denied and Huffman discharged.

The district attorney immediately proceeded to draw a new information and a warrant was placed in the constable's hands for Huffman's re-arrest, but on looking for him it was found he had left town.

IMPORTANT DECISION RENDERED

La Grande Land Office Hands Down Decision Upholding Entryman.

(Enterprise Chieftan.)

Henry W. Downs' homestead entry on the South Fork, six miles south of Lostine, has been upheld by the La Grande land office, and the contest instituted by the government held for dismissal.

Mr. Downs filed on the land July 28, 1903, and on April 26, 1909, submitted final five year proof, but the certificate was withheld upon protest of the field division chief. Contest proceedings were ordered Jan. 25, 1910, upon the ground, "That the land embraced in this entry is mineral in character, and chiefly valuable therefore."

Testimony was taken in Enterprise last spring, the defendant being represented by Attorney J. A. Burdick. The opinion dismissing the contest, written by Receiver C. R. Eberhard, is comprehensive and shows clearly the poor case made out against the entry. It says, "Before the govern-

ment had half finished its case, it must have been apparent to the special agent that the government had signally failed in its contention; and by the time the laborious, tedious and irrelevant matter about residence and cultivation, which were not issues in the case, was finished, it is disclosed by the record that one whole day had been consumed by an expert shorthand reporter."

It is further stated that the burden of proof is invariably on mineral claimants to show that the land is more valuable for mining than agricultural purposes as a present fact; not that it might possibly hereafter develop minerals in such quantities and of such character as to establish its mineral value.

It is recommended that the final certificate issue and the entry pass to patent without further hardship or delay.

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
