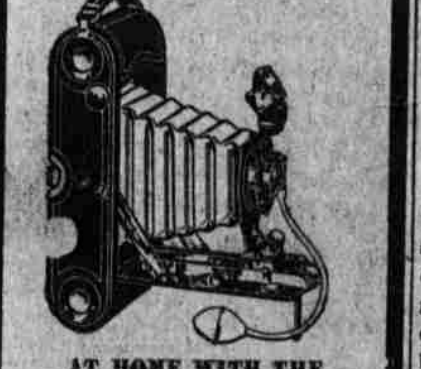

**Longer Hours—Less Men.**  
San Francisco, Aug. 26.—After a week's trial the order establishing an eight-hour day and five days a week was rescinded in the San Francisco shops of the Pacific division of the Southern Pacific today. At the same time an order was issued to reduce the shop force. The company officials say that more than 10 or possibly 12 per cent of the force has been laid off. No reason is given for the change of policy. The men are still working but are becoming alarmed. It is expected that the men will be reinstated within 60 days.

Matters of extreme importance to the welfare of the Union county fair were threshed out at a meeting of the fair board last night. The board decided to employ an assistant secretary who shall give his entire time to the fair from now on until the big event occurs. The president, A. L. Richardson, was empowered to employ the assistant.

### Baby Show Provided For.

A baby show at which \$25 will be distributed in prizes, was arranged for and Mrs. A. L. Richardson was made chairman of that committee. Mrs. Richardson officiated on that committee last year and made a signal success of it.

### Public Wedding Again.

A public wedding, wherein a large list of gifts in the way of household goods will be thrown in, was provided for. Several merchants have already agreed to donate valuable and useful presents to the couple who will be married during the fair, and as the public wedding feature last year was one of the very finest attractions it is believed there will be a rush for the honor this year. Flour, clothing, blankets and household goods have already been donated and more is promised. It will be worth while for the couple. Other matters of much importance were gone over at the meeting last night.

### Notes on Commission Plan.

Knoxville, Tenn., Aug. 26.—A special election was held in Knoxville today to decide the question of the proposed amendment of the city charter so as to provide for the commission plan of government. Advocates of the commission plan, including nearly all of the business men of the city, have waged a vigorous campaign in its behalf and are confident that the final results of the balloting will show a substantial majority in favor of the charter amendment.

## SEATTLE WILD OVER FARE FIGHT

Seattle, Aug. 26.—Denounced at a mass meeting of more than 5,000 citizens, and later hanged in effigy as an enemy of the people, Federal Judge Hanford today is the center of a civic storm here, almost without parallel in the history of the Pacific northwest.

All is the outgrowth of a street car transfer fight between the Seattle-Renton, Southern railway and the people of Rainier valley. The supreme court affirmed that the people on the line were entitled to a transfer to the city street cars upon five cent payment. The railroad has appealed to the United States supreme court and in the meantime refuses to obey the court's order and give transfers.

Hanford issued a temporary injunction prohibiting the people from asking for transfers.

### LEE BADLY TANGLED.

Not surprising if any confusion in Wholesale Murders.

Evansville, Ind., Aug. 26.—William Lee became hopelessly tangled today in his statements concerning the death of his mother, father and brother and the subsequent burning of their house and a confession that he murdered them will not surprise the authorities. He was transferred from Booneville jail to the county jail here today.

### Danish Society Meets.

Clinton, Ia., Aug. 26.—Delegates and visitors are here from Des Moines, Cedar Rapids, Waterloo and other cities for the annual convention of the United Danish Young People's society of Iowa. The sessions will begin tomorrow and continue until next Wednesday.

### Campaign in Maryland.

Baltimore, Md., Aug. 26.—The political campaign in Maryland virtually closed today. The primaries will be held next Tuesday, when both parties will select candidates for governor and other state officers to be elected this fall. Interest centers chiefly in the contest between Arthur P. Gorman and Blair Lee for the democratic nomination for governor.

### "Some" Pin Money.

Washington, Aug. 26.—Sixty-seven dollars daily for pin money is Mrs. Rose Hutchins' idea of the least amount a millionaire's wife can scrape along on. In petitioning the equity court here to compel her invalid husband to increase her \$1,000 monthly allowance she submitted a list of her ordinary expenditures. The list aggregated just \$2,013.

### Christal Divorce Filed.

New York, Aug. 26.—Mrs. Rosa Christal, the actress and former model, intimated to her friend, Evelyn Thaw, today that she had filed a suit for divorce against Leo Christal, also an actor.

### Man Poor; Family Rich.

New York, Aug. 26.—Dr. Charles Meyers lived in poverty and died of the lack of proper food while his relatives today will inherit a half million. He lived in a tiny room and did his own cooking and refused assistance of friends.

### Hazzard Hearing on.

Seattle, Aug. 26.—This afternoon arguments for the defense in the case against Dr. Linda Hazzard began at Port Orchard. She is accused of having caused the death of Claire Williamson by the fast cure.
