GRAND STAND CRASHES.

Three Hundred Injured when Framework Falls.

Elgin, Ill., Aug. 26.—As the first car in the national trophy race flashed past the stand on its first lap on the long race, the western end of the grand stand collapsed carrying down 500 people. Over 300 were injured, a number seriously—two women whose legs were broken, may die.

Order was quickly restored, though the soldiers and deputies made a violent show of force in doing it. The crowds were clubbed back for interfering with the rescue work.

Mrs. Ray Graham, daughter of Senator Lorimer, was among the seriously injured. The ambulance took the injured from the field while the autos lined up to resume the race.

Section Foreman Threatened.

Upon complaint of Mrs. G. W. Jones that George Argitor, a Greek, had threatened to kill her husband who is O. W. R. & N. section foreman at Thorn Hollow, Deputy District Attorney W. C. E. Pruitt this morning issued a warrant for the arrest of the man and the officers are now looking for him. From her story it seems that the Greek worked upon Jones' gang and was recently discharged, whereupon he made his threat to kill, says the Pendleton East Oregon.

In view of the recent saloon riot in which Mike Moran, section foreman at Cayuse, was almost fatally stabbed by a foreigner on the same kind of a grievance, the deputy district attorney did not hesitate in issuing the warrant.

CIRCLES GLOBE IN 40 DAYS.
