

STOLEN HORSE FOUND AGAIN

THIEF, HOWEVER, MAKES GOOD HIS ESCAPE.

Takes Kirtley Animal to Weiser and Sells It for \$50.

To steal a horse from the Kirtley livery barn, and instead of riding to Elmore as he said he would, he offered Weiser and sold the animal there for \$50 was the case, cut by a stranger last week. The horse, worth considerably more than \$50, is now in Weiser but the thief is missing, having probably made his way to the east somewhere. Last Wednesday a stranger appeared at the Kirtley barn asking for a riding horse that would carry him to a point near Kamela where he was to inspect a ranch with a view of buying it. The management of the barn gave him an animal belonging to Ella Kirtley and the fellow set out. Instead of going west he reached Baker that night and soon after pulled up at Weiser where he sold the horse for \$50. The local police have traced the animal to Weiser but there he disappeared and it is likely he has made good his escape.

When he left the Kirtley barn he mounted from the right side, and he didn't know much about horses and put up a line of talk that made Mr. Kirtley think the horse was in the hands of a tenderfoot.

That he could ride the horse to Baker in that short space of time clearly shows that he was a horseman of no mean ability.

BREAK GROUND FOR BUILDING

STRUCTURE TO STAND IN MIDDLE OF TRIANGLE.

Large Crew of Men Now Excavating for Basement in Building.

Forty feet of space will be left between the Arcade theatre building and the east side of the federal building, according to definite setting of stakes made this morning preparatory to excavation. A half dozen teams and a dozen men today broke ground for the building and by the time the basement has been excavated, the material for the foundation will be on hand meaning the work can proceed without further delay.

New York Digging \$257,400,000 Subway to Be 200 Miles Long

NEW YORK has at last begun work on the extensions to its subway system. Improvements that will cost, according to official estimates, \$257,400,000 and will require four years to complete. The total track to be constructed will be 200 miles, though much of it will not be underground, as under the plans proposed the trains will cease to burrow like a mole after leaving the thickly settled portions of the metropolis and will journey to the suburbs on elevated structures. The new subways will ultimately reach every one of the five boroughs of the city, and it is hoped that they will relieve the congestion of the present transit lines and solve the problem of future growth. The actual beginning of work on the new subways attracted a crowd of thousands, and the police had difficulty in holding the people back. Chairman Wilcox of the public service commission used a silver spade to move the first dirt, which was carefully placed in a glass jar to be preserved in the office of the commission. One of the pictures shows Chairman Wilcox with the silver spade, and the other shows the dirt in the glass jar. The crowd carried away much dirt and bits of asphalt as souvenirs.

Accused of Killing Stepson. Palo Alto, Cal., Aug. 28.—J. F. Brisley has been detained in jail today awaiting the result of an investigation into the death of his seven months old stepson, George Partington, who died an account of poisoning. He says the baby accidentally swallowed it, but the mother and the police held to another theory.
