

NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the common council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, on the 28th day of June, 1911, creating improvement district No. 33 and designating M avenue as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said common council on the 19th day of July, 1911, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of H avenue, in said improvement district as hereinafter described, by building board walks, the council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:

All that portion of H avenue, from the west curb line of Fourth street, to the east curb line of Second street.

(A) And the property affected or benefited by said improvement is as follows:

Lots 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, block 96; lots 5, 6, 7 and 8, block 95, and lot 5, block 94, all in Chaplin's addition to the town of La Grande, Oregon.

Notice is hereby further given that the council will levy a special assessment on all the property affected and benefited by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$399.30. That the council will, on the



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30th day of August, 1911, meet at the council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock, p. m., to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.

SALEM FAIR PLANS SHOW GREAT SUCCESS FOR STATE FAIR

Salem, Or., Aug. 29.—Beginning with the walk that leads from the Southern Pacific railroad station leading into the fair grounds and ending with the big mile track, many things have been made over in Salem this year. This spirit reflects in the city proper where the merchants have purchased some 60 big boulevard cluster lights for permanent improvement and ordered them installed by the time the state fair opens September 11.

New Surface for Racetrack. Frank Meredith, secretary of the Oregon State Fair, and J. H. Booth, president of the board, have worked out the regeneration of the racetrack until it shows practically no cupping at this time. These two "doctors" figured that the reason that the track acted so badly when put to hard use was because the clay mixture in the top mixture had "died." Consequently they tried the experiment of using an antidote of new clay which they mixed into the old top dressing and made the surface compact with the aid of a drag and a heavy roller. It added new life to the track and, now after a few weeks trial, it is found to be just what was needed for a "sick" track. The trainers have given their approval of the new course, and when they are satisfied there need be little objection from the spectators.

Cattle Pens Much Better. Every one of the cattle pens and each stall for the use of exhibiting horsemen has been disinfected and bedded down ready for immediate use. The walk have been carefully lined out and the paddock entirely rearranged so that it is more commodious and better ventilated with all the protection necessary to cool out the stock. Every roof has been patched up and much care has been given to the floral displays on the grounds. Not a detail has been overlooked, and with the exception of the exhibits, everything is in readiness for the opening of the fair now.

Character of Stock Entries. As in past years the stock entries

will provide an unusual amount of attention. The classes include competition for cash premiums in the horse show for thoroughbreds, standard breeds, Morgans, carriage horses, saddlers, Shetland ponies, roadsters, trotters, pacers, French and German coaches, hackneys, Percherons, Belgians, Shires, Clydesdales, draft horses, jacks, jennets and mules. In the cattle division the entries are quite full for shorthorns, Herefords, polled Angus, Galloways, Bevons, Holsteins, Guernseys, Ayrshires, Jerseys, fat cattle and milch cows. In the sheep department, every well known variety is represented and classed, as is true of the proposed exhibit of swine. The poultry and domestic pet classes are well represented and the educational and domestic science exhibits are sure to prove of unusual interest.

Fuller's Band Will Come. Aside from the professional exhibits of cattle and the sterling bill of horse racing, much attention has been given to the entertainment feature of the fair. Ferullo's band has been engaged for the week and some \$2,000 has been spent for free attractions in addition to those offered by the aggregation of Parker shows which will be in evidence the whole week the fair is on. The program calls for special attention. Monday is for Oregon pioneers; Tuesday is Woodmen of the World day, Wednesday is Salem day, Thursday is Portland day, Friday, German societies day and Saturday Good Roads day. Special attractions are offered for each of these particular days and special speakers are to be on hand for the official opening of the exercise allotted to the various special days. In every instance the ceremonies will be short, interesting and to the point.

Reduced rates are in effect on all the railroad lines for the fair, which opens September 11, and closes September 16.

STAFF MEMBER FAVORS MILITIA

ESTABLISHMENT OF A NATIONAL GUARD SEEMS POSSIBLE.

Semi-Official Letter from Finzer's Staff Member Encouraging.

Probability of official sanction to organize a militia company here as a part of the Oregon guard, is contained in a semi-official communication received today by L. C. Pratt who some time ago wrote Adjutant General Finzer regarding the possibility of establishing a company here.

Referring again to the national guard proposition, listen to the following from Wilfred F. Smith, member of the general staff at Portland received by me yesterday," said Mr. Pratt today. "I am very anxious to see you make that La Grande company go. I will warn you before hand that it will be no easy job to keep up a company of militia—to keep up the enthusiasm and attendance. Being on the staff I am familiar with the troubles of the out-of-town companies—Baker City, Pendleton, Oregon, City, Woodburn and Salem companies. However, I know of no reason why La Grande should not as well as the rest of them, and in my opinion, all the probabilities are in favor of it doing even better." This was a personal letter from friend Smith, and cannot, of course, be quoted as official, but we are sure of strong support from Smith when the matter is taken up by the staff.
