GRANGE HOLDS ELECTION SOON

WILL TAKE PLACE AT GRANGE HALL SEPT. 29.

Grange Has Been Marked by Rapid Growth in This Territory.

The third annual education day of Blue Mountain Grange No. 345 will be held on September the 16th at their hall east of La Grande. The first meeting held two years ago was only a local affair held upon the suggestion of the state lecturer to assist in securing better rural schools but the event proved so popular that it was made an annual event and the second year there were 67 teachers present, representing practically every part of the county, while this year plans are being made to entertain about a hundred. To assist in making the day a success, County School Superintendent E. E. Bragg, who is also chairman of the grande educational committee, has called a county school meeting for the same day. The program will include addresses and papers on lively educational questions by the leading speakers of the county while the readings, recitations and musical numbers will be unusually good. To accommodate the visitors on that day the local grange will build an addition on their hall which will afterwards be used for kitchen and dining hall for the local meetings. The local members of the United Amateur Press association will have an exhibit of the work done by that organization along educational lines to assist in entertaining the visitors. The meeting will begin at 10 a. m.

LOUIS BONDS PROVE HEAVY

WHITE SLAYER HELD ON \$4,000 BONDS YESTERDAY.

White Slaver Given Preliminary Hearing Before Commission.

Pendleton, Ore., Aug. 31.—United States Marshal Hamlin is en route to Portland today having in his custody Chris Louis, the Greek who was arrested last week in La Grande on a white slave charge. He was brought before United States Commissioner Vida Johnston yesterday afternoon and bound over to the federal grand jury under \$4,000 bonds. Falling to produce that amount he will be held in jail at Portland until the meeting of that jury.

Louis was formerly a cook at the Queen chop house and it is alleged he enticed Mrs. Grace Dillman, a 17-year-old girl of this city, to go with him to Walla Walla and later to La Grande. There she was found in a rooming house by the police officers and she stated to them that she was being held as the Greek's slave. Her husband in this city was notified and swore out a complaint against the Greek who was brought here to appear before the local commissioner.

Inasmuch as he is alleged to have taken the girl from one state to another, the charge against him is a federal one and he will be dealt with by the federal authorities.

WALLOWA STOCK SHIPMENTS BIG

ABOUT SIXTY CARLOADS OF SHEEP READY TO SHIP.

Chicago Market to Get Consignment From Wallowa.

(Enterprise Record.)
From 50 to 60 car loads of sheep and lambs, will be shipped from this county to Chicago about September 10. The number of cars is being added to daily so there may be two special train loads by the date of shipment. J. H. Dobbin, Graves Bros., Geo. S. Craig, Fred Falconer, Hanson Bros., and a number of smaller growers will contribute to the shipment. Lambs for the market will be the principal part of the shipment, but stuff for feeders will also go along and about 15 cars of wethers. A trainload of wethers is talked of for later.

About 20,000 head will go out September 10. The eastern market is reported stronger almost daily.

GIBBON FOREST FIRE SERIOUS

VOLUNTEERS SENT OUT FROM PENDLETON.

Reports Indicate Flames Will Be Mastered Soon.

Pendleton, Aug. 31.—Responding to an urgent appeal for reinforcement from W. J. Furnish and other ranchers on the upper Umatilla river, above Gibbon, 23 miles east of Pendleton, a force of 50 volunteers, under command of Frank Earnhart, departed aboard special coaches attached to train No. 10 at 1 o'clock this morning for the scene of the blaze in the Wenaha forest reserve.

A telegram from Earnhart to Dan P. Smythe sent shortly before noon says that the volunteers have been working since their arrival and expect to have the blaze under complete control today. It is burning in timber on the north side of the river about one mile above Gibbon station.

Last night's alarm reported that a number of ranches along the river were threatened by the blaze, which had broken beyond bounds and was no longer under control by the ranchers and a force of 40 men, who had been exerting strenuous efforts for two days to check its spread. It was reported at the same time that Wenaha Springs was threatened, but later reports today say that the resort is in no danger.

The message from Earnhart to Mr. Smythe says that Forest Ranger Sullens will remain on the job for several days to guard against further outbreaks.

County Judge J. W. Maloney, who returned yesterday from the scene of the fire brings the report that the fire was under control and the damage not heavy, asserted today that he believed the reports from that section had been greatly exaggerated.

Other reports, however, indicate that the fire is burning fiercely, and while the timber is not of a particularly valuable variety, the situation has caused great anxiety to the ranchers of that neighborhood.

Trainmen also report a fire near Kamela which has been burning for several days.

Last Report.
Just before going to press the following dispatch was received by W. L. Thompson:

"Change in the wind has increased fire danger. Boys having a time to control it; are about exhausted. Think should have at least ten fresh men with good leader on No. 18 tonight. Must bring provisions and some bedding. Very important that fire be confined to present limits."
