MARCH NUCLEUS OF FUTURE DAY

PARADE OF WORKING MEN ANNUALLY HERE PREDICTED.

Burlesque Yesterday Creates Plenty of Amusement for Everyone.

What is believed to be the beginning of annual labor parades in this city supplied a good deal of amusement to a dozen craftsmen of the city yesterday who went through a burlesque on the down town streets that lasted several hours and supplied heaps of fun for the spectators and for the craftsmen themselves who comprised the parade. In lieu of a labor day parade in which all laboring men band themselves together and march, these men inaugurated a burlesque band composed of one snaredrum and nickel horns and baby toot! toots! All combined the music was not exactly classical but it made a racket—the men got the cadence of their steps from the snaredrum manipulated by J. R. Kay, a steamfitter of the Bradley & Co. plumbing shop. Though he may never have belong to Sousa's band he got the roll out of the dried skin in first class shape. The marchers posed for pictures and kept up their march until the close of the afternoon.

ICE PLANT IS TO BE MODERN

NORTH POWDER BUILDING IS TO COST \$25,000.

Big Crew of Men Constructing Plant for Ice Manufacture.

Thirty-five thousand dollars are being spent on the new Pacific Coast Refrigerator company's ice plant, recently purchased from Andrew Lup at North Powder, and the workmanship will bring forth a splendid structure and plant according to City Recorder Clyde Scheurer of North Powder who was in the city yesterday.

The building in which the ice is to be stored is 114x145 and the foundation and lower floor are to be of cement. The Moore Bros., contractors, have the contract and are doing a splendid job of it. The piling on which will be constructed the chute to load cars with are also being driven and as a crew of 25 men are at work on the plant it should be finished soon.

Several air space walls will make it possible to do away with sawdust as a medium of keeping out heat, and not only in this respect but from every standpoint will the plant be splendid and up to date.

Letter Carriers at Rochester.

Rochester, N. Y., Sept. 4.—For the last 24 hours there has been an almost continuous line of letter carriers arriving in Rochester. They came from all parts of the country to take part in the Labor Day parade today and the 18th annual convention of their national association which holds its opening exercises in Convention hall tonight. The convention sessions will continue through the week. Postmaster General Hitchcock, Postmaster Morgan of New York City and Postmaster Warren of Detroit are among the scheduled speakers. Los Angeles and Cleveland are contesting for the next convention.
