HIS LAST WORDS BEFORE LEAVING FOR PRISON.

Writes to Union Scout That Mission-Steal-er's Innocence Maintained. Steadfastly maintaining his innocence, William Hogg was taken to the Salem penitentiary this morning. Just before taking his departure he sent a communication to the Union Scout in which he vehemently maintains his innocence of the charge of which he is accused. The letter follows:

I feel it the duty of every citizen of this state to be interested in such horrible cases as I have been unjustly convicted of. If there had been anyone investigating this case immediately to see if there had been a horse tied to that fence or if there was any tracks of that girl where she claimed this took place it would have proved me innocent. Whenever this kind of thing is reported all should look into the matter thoroughly. Any man that has a family of orphan children and is raising them together in the proper way should receive the good will of everyone. More attention should be given to the orphans of the country and not send so many missionaries away to foreign lands. In my opinion begin the missionary work at home in which God will approve.
