Divorce Suits Attract Attention.
Wilmington, Del., Sept. 18.—The suit for divorce brought by John Bancroft, Jr., against his wife, Madeleine Du Pont Bancroft, and the counter suit brought by the wife are set for trial at the term of the superior court which opened here today, and the case promises to be the most sensational in the history of the commonwealth of "peaches and troubled politics." As matters now stand, only the unexpected can stop the suits begun by husband and wife. The latter is the eldest daughter of Alfred I. Du Pont, the millionaire vice president of the Du Pont Powder company. Mr. Bancroft brought his suit on statutory grounds denying the paternity of his wife's infant son. In the papers filed in the case Mr. Bancroft called the child Max Haidler, Jr., and made it a co-defendant. Mrs. Bancroft, in her counter suit, charges her husband with unfaithfulness and extreme cruelty. She also pleads not guilty to his charges against her.

AD. CLUB SEES THE GRANDE RONDE

AS GUESTS AT HOT LAKE SANATORIUM THEY HAD A FINE TIME.

GREAT COUNTRY, THEY SAY

La Grande Auto Owners Took the Party for a Spin Over the Valley Yesterday and Treated Them to a Great Surprise—Advertising Is Needed.

They came; they saw; they went away delighted.

This tells the story in brief of a visit to the Hot Lake Sanatorium and the Grande Ronde valley of the Portland Ad club yesterday. Twenty-five strong they left Portland for the Eastern Oregon country and twenty-five strong they stuck to see more of the great valley, enjoy the Pierce-Curry-Wallington-Karkeet hospitality at the splendid sanatorium which is a pride of the valley and of Eastern Oregon.

Arriving at the Lake in their special car late Saturday night they were comfortably housed and on Sunday morning the club was given the Hot Lake drill which is said to eclipse any form of military work yet known. The drill consists of a march several times around the sanatorium building and then a jaunt up the mountain. This was to test the wind of the lads who draw trade by the use of their brains and pencils. Not a one flagged, not even old Editor Flagg of Elgin who stood the test like a youth of 20. When the summit was reached Dr. Fred Curry delivered his eloquent lecture on the early history of the Grande Ronde, told the visitors how the sanatorium came to be built, and even went so far as to carefully figure out how nature compounded the different chemicals to cause the hottest water in the world to flow from an Oregon mountain.

After lunch fifteen automobiles from La Grande driven by different business and professional men went to the Lake and took the ad. men for a spin through Union, Cove and the lower part of the valley, coming into La Grande and passing through the principal party of the city.

"Well, I guess this town has grown some," remarked Eddie Brown, an ad. club member. He used to travel through this section but left the road before La Grande began to put on her good clothes, such as pavement, etc.

Returning to the sanatorium each visitor was subjected to a bath because it was the will of the host that said each member needed bathing. In the bath house it was found that two members had been guilty of breach of trust and a kangaroo court proceeded to try them in the most approved manner under the Pierce-Curry-Wallington code. Despite the eloquent appeals from attorneys for the defense the jury found the club men guilty and they were forthwith sentenced to a mud bath.

Banquet a Great Feature.

The crowning climax of the pleasant event was the delightful banquet served in the Hot Lake grill room at 7:30 o'clock. The usual dainty menu for which Hot Lake is widely known was augmented with extra features appropriate to the occasion. Speeches began with consomme and did not close until the black coffee and cigar course. Senator Pierce acted as toastmaster and an ideal one he was. Calling upon different members of the club in a way that brought up some humorous thought the entire program went with a vim and ginger which was delightful to experience. Besides the Ad. club members, speeches were delivered by Dr. Fred Curry, Dr. Karkeet, E. H. Flagg and George H. Curry.

When the fast mail's whistle warned the party of the hour for departure it was like a large family of boys bidding a fond goodbye to an indulgent father, for the ad. club felt very kindly toward Senator Pierce for the splendid entertainment. He in turn appreciated the visit and in Whitcomb Riley fashion shook their hands, saying, "Goodbye, boys, take good keer of yourselves."
