To Discuss Extra Fare Question.

St. Paul, Minn., Sept. 19.—The 56th annual convention of the American Association of General Passenger and Ticket Agents began its sessions here today with Colonel Samuel Moody, passenger traffic manager of the Pennsylvania railroad, presiding. The convention will continue for several days. One of the timely topics to be discussed is the recommendation that railroad passengers be charged extra for using high class equipment. It has been suggested that a quarter of a cent a mile be added to the price of a ticket for a passenger using an observation or a parlor car. In support of the proposal it is contended that the railroads expend large amounts to furnish this class of travelers fast train service, luxurious surroundings and special attention of various kinds. The association will thoroughly discuss the matter, but any action it may take will be purely advisory in its nature.

A notable feature of the convention will be the banquet tomorrow night. Among those scheduled to speak at the banquet are James J. Hill, President McCrea of the Pennsylvania system, Vice President Daly of the New York Central lines, and several representatives of government railways in France and Germany.
