TRAIL BLAZER NOW 80 YEARS

**A. C. HUNTINGTON CELEBRATES
BIRTHDAY ANNIVERSARY.**

Came to Oregon When Small Settlements Only Existed Here.

Yesterday A. C. Huntington, one of the earliest pioneers of Grande Ronde valley enjoyed his 80th birthday. Upon reaching his majority he succumbed to the enticing stories that drifted back from the then new world, the Pacific coast, and bid the old Maine home goodbye, taking passage on a New York steam, January 20, 1834, bound for San Francisco, via the Isthmus of Panama, arriving at his destination in February.

Following several years as an active miner in California, sometimes lucky and sometimes "broke," in the year of 1861 he joined a party for the Salmon river country and in the fall of 1862 enroute for the Boise country he entered the beautiful Grande Ronde valley and made camp with the Iowa settlement, which had just arrived over the long immigrant trail, at the foot of Mt. Emily. As the winter was near at hand the miners concluded to remain with this camp until spring. However, when the time for the miners to proceed was at hand Mr. Huntington did not answer to roll call, owing to what later proved to be a greater attraction than gold—a fair daughter from Iowa, Elizabeth Helen Baker, to whom he was later married. He built a home in what is now South La Grande, where he lived until 1885. During this time he was actively engaged in the furniture and upholstery business and many a pioneer family still owns an original piece made in the old shop turned with the old horse power and turning lathe. Wall paper, carpets and furniture were also freighted in to supply the demand.

Mr. Huntington was a member of the pioneer brass band, with D. S. Kinsey, "Bogey" Sheets and others, and for several years was an active member of the city council. In 1885 he built and moved into his present home at 1710 Fourth street.

For years he was the only music dealer in Union, Wallowa, Baker and Grant counties, with headquarters in this city.

While in his 81st year Mr. Huntington is hale and active personally giving his attention to his property interests which are quite extensive. His many friends join the Observer in wishing him many more years of activity and prosperity.

Section 1.—The Mayor and Recorder of the City of La Grande, Oregon, are

hereby authorized to enter into a contract with Jesse L. Strawn & Co. for the construction of a board walk on "H" Avenue and Second Street in the City of La Grande, in accordance with their bid now on file with the City Recorder and heretofore accepted by the Council and in accordance with the general plans and specifications now on file and adopted for the construction of such sidewalks.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval by the Mayor and publication in one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer.

Passed the Council on the 20th day of September, 1911 by five councilmen voting therefor.

Approved by the Mayor this 22nd day of September, 1911.
