TRAMP'S FOOT CRUSHED.

Passenger Train Injures Tramp—Operation Follows at Hospital.

After a night of intense suffering William Province, lately of Seattle, but originally from Texas, lies at the Grandé Ronde hospital today in a satisfactory condition with one foot amputated as the result of an accident at the local depot last night. Trying to "beat" his way, Province was caught in some way while climbing on to the "rods" and one foot was run over and he was otherwise badly hurt. Drs. Bacon and Hall amputated the crushed foot at the hospital later on. His family resides at Ennarrilla, Texas, and they have been notified.
