BENCH SHOW THIS WEEK

PRIZE WINNING DOGS TO BE PUT ON SHOW BOARDS.

Friday and Saturday Given Over to Bench Show—Jordan in Charge.

Union county's annual bench show is to be held in conjunction with the county fair, next Friday and Saturday. The matter of arrangement of details have been left with John Jordan and this afternoon he issued his final instructions to prospective exhibitors. The entrance fees must be in his hands by Friday morning at 10 o'clock and the dogs must be on the show ground all day Friday and Saturday. A competent man will be on hand to care for the animals that may be exhibited and very desirable prizes have been promised. The judging will be done by competent men and it is believed that the bench show of last year, which was very popular, will be outdone by this important adjunct to the county fair, this year. Mr. Jordan can be seen personally or be telephoned between now and Friday morning.

To Adjust Baptist Differences.

Old Point Comfort, Va., Sept. 27.—To adjust certain differences that have arisen between the two great divisions of the Baptist church in America, a joint conference was begun here today by representatives of the Northern Baptist convention and representatives of the Southern Baptist convention. Difficulties growing out of recent New Mexico organizations form the principal matter in dispute. Some New Mexico congregations withdrew from the Northern Baptist convention, and joined the Southern. With it is claimed, the co-operation of some southern leaders. The action has produced considerable friction, which it is hoped will be removed by the present conference.

Dry Farmers in Convention.

Ablene, Texas, Sept. 27.—The second annual meeting of the Central West Texas Dry Farming congress opened here today with several hundred men interested in raising grain and vegetables with little rainfall present. The session will last two days, during which time a number of agricultural experts and practical farmers will explain to the convention what dry farming methods can accomplish under seemingly adverse conditions.

Theatrical Man to Hang.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Sept. 27.—Tomorrow is the day set for execution in the Luzerne county jail of George L. Marlan, the former theatrical man and hotel clerk, convicted of the murder of his wife, Frances Lee Brooks. The crime was committed nearly two years ago in the office of the chief of police in this city. The woman had deserted her husband for another man. Marlan traced her to this city from Plainfield, N. J., and under pretense of effecting a reconciliation had the officers take her to the police headquarters. There, when he was left alone with her for a minute, he shot her twice and killed her. At the trial he pleaded emotional insanity.

In Memory of Pioneer Methodist.

Plainfield, Ill., Sept. 27.—The delegates to the Rock Elver Methodist conference in session at Joliet came to Plainfield this afternoon and assisted at the dedication of a monument in memory of Jesse Walker, a noted pioneer of Methodism in Illinois and the middle west. Bishop Hamilton of Boston presided over the exercises and Bishop Hendrix, of the M. E. church, South, delivered the oration of the day.

Cotton Manufacturers Meet.

Manchester, Vt., Sept. 27.—Opening this evening with an address of welcome by Governor Mead and the presidential address by Franklin W. Hobbs of Boston, the 91st semi-annual meeting of the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers will continue its sessions over tomorrow and Friday. Many important papers on cotton manufacturing have been prepared, dealing principally with the technical side of the industry.

Another Pure Food Crusade.

New York, Sept. 27.—Another pure food crusade, to be conducted on a broader plan than any of the similar movements of the past, is soon to be launched by the National Civic federation. At a meeting held today at the New York board of trade and transportation the new pure food and drug department of the federation was formally organized and preliminary plans discussed for the proposed campaign against alleged food and drug adulterators, misbranners and short weigh-
