## GREAT POLITICAL ORGANIZATION FORMED IN WASHINGTON STATE

North Yakima, Wn., Sept. 27.—Organizations with an aggregate voting membership of upwards of 100,000 men and women are directly and indirectly represented in a federation of farmers and working men formed here yesterday for the promotion of progressive political measures. The organization will wage a vigorous campaign for the adoption of pending constitutional amendments providing for the initiative, referendum and recall and will demand that candidates for the next legislature will pledge themselves to a submission to the national amendment giving the people power to initiate amendments to the constitution.
