summoned to appear before the committee. Among those whose testimony is considered important are E. A. Edmonds, Appletown Wis., Stephenson's campaign manager, who is alleged to have spread the aged millionaire's money broadcast to influence votes; John H. Puelicher, cashier of a bank, said to have been custodian of the Stephenson campaign fund; W. R. Knell, former sheriff, then of large political influence; three score or more

witnesses who testified in a former legislative probe, and half a hundred district lieutenants who worked under the directions of Campaign Manager Edmonds, and others. Banker Puelicher was unable to undergo a full examination at an investigation by a former legislature because a doctor ordered him to a European health resort, the trip to be made without delay.

Senator Stephenson's friend declare he took no part in his campaign whatever but admit he furnished whatever money his managers asked without protest.

Stephenson was investigated, after the 1908 primary, by a joint committee of the Wisconsin legislature. It comprised five representatives and three senators. The former reported in his favor, the latter against him. Last summer the subject was called up again and both branches of the legislature asked the United States senate to look into the heavy primary expenditures made by Stephenson.

Unusual interest centers in the possibility that Stephenson will appear on the witness stand. Intimations have been spread that he will claim to have contributed money to La Follette campaigns a few years ago when they were political allies. The two senators now are very cordial enemies.

The breach between them came in 1908. It was due, La Follette supporters say, to alleged broken faith on the part of Stephenson. They claim that Stephenson gave a pledge that if he should be elected to serve during a vacancy in the United States senate, from May, 1907 to March 3, 1909, caused by the resignation of Senator John C. Spooner, he would not be a candidate for re-election. He was elected through the aid of La Follette, according to all popular impression, but Stephenson is alleged to have conceived the idea that the progressive was secretly opposed to him.

In the Senate Stephenson allied himself with the "stand-pat" republicans under the Aldrich leadership and this resulted in attacks upon the venerable magnate by La Follette in his weekly. At the end of the senate term caused by the Spooner vacancy, it is charged, Stephenson went back on his promise not to run again, joined in with the Wisconsin standpatters, and was re-elected.

Stephenson's determination to win another term in the senate in the face of La Follette's opposition, it is said, was responsible for the apparently careless expenditure of money in the fight.

The senate investigators are Heyburn (republican, Idaho), chairman; Sutherland, (republican, Utah), Bradley (republican, Kentucky), Penner (democratic, Kentucky), and Pomeroy (democratic, Utah).

CIRCUIT COURT SESSION OPENS

UNION CASE INVOLVING NOTE THE FIRST CALLED.

Many Important Cases Set for Hearing This Term—Cases Arranged.

Circuit court convened today with the calling of a new grand jury and the resumption of trials. Davison vs. Brown, a Union piece of litigation involving a note, opened the term this afternoon. The forenoon was given over to adjustment and arrangement of cases for hearing this term and this afternoon the first trial was called to order. The docket is quite long and as there are several important cases to come up it is likely that the jury trials will occupy considerable more than the present week.

At a late hour the list of grand jurors had not been reported.

W. S. SNOOK BUYS THREE HOUSES AND LOTS.

Will Build Modern Home Near Geibel Residence at Once.

It is truly an indication of unbounded faith in a city when so many of the farmers are investing in La Grande property. Saturday W. S. Snook who recently sold his farm east of Island City, purchased through the Geo. H. Currey real estate agency three houses of Mrs. S. C. Zuber, on the corner of Seventh and O streets. Those houses are all furnished and are divided into suites of rooms for light house-keeping which are always in demand. Mr. Snook bought this property as an investment. He also bought a lot on M street just across the street from Fred Geibel's and has let the contract for a modern home, which is now under course of construction.

RAILROAD CAUSES TROUBLE IN CHINA.

Coolies Fearing Loss of Work Oppose Building Tracks Beyond Town of Ichang.

Seattle, Wash. Sept. 30.—Mrs. F. D. Gamewell, wife of the famous engineer and college professor who planned the defense of Pekin during the Boxer rebellion looks for another outburst in the Szechuen district of China, even more violent than the one which sent United States gunboats up the Yangtze River to protect the lives of the Americans, Mrs. Gamewell who is a missionary and lives in China, arrived from that country yesterday. She said:

"The real cause of the Szechuen disturbance is the railroad which is now being constructed between Ichang and Chengtu, the capital city and the common district. Ichang is 400 miles up the river and beyond this point there is practically no trade except by a dangerous water route. On the two-thirds of all the vessels which take freight up the river beyond this point are wrecked each year. Water transportation ends all freight must be moved on the backs of coolies. The coolies realize that the railroad will take away their only means of support and they are responsive to the uprising.

"There is one thing which will aggravate the situation and which is not generally known. The Chinese who are building this thousand miles of railroad have borrowed the money from British and German financiers who, disgust d with the slow progress of the work have decided to take it over themselves and the thought of the hated Europeans building the line will drive the coolies crazy."
