WEDDING AT FAIR POPULAR

GEORGE I. ANDERSON AND MISS WITT MARRIED.

Service Dignified and Guests Applaud Their Approval Of It.

Back-grounded by rosy-cheeked Imbler apples, canopied with a roof that housed about 600 people and standing in the midst of Union county's best soil production, George I. Anderson and Miss Clara Witt, both of Cove, were united in holy wedlock last evening at 8:30 o'clock at the pavilion of the fair grounds. The bride and groom were ushered through a human lane from the door to the rear end of the skating rink—the fair ground's pavilion—by Fred J. Holmes, treasurer of the fair commission.

At the dais Dr. J. D. Gillilan awaited the bridal party. Though the band played snatches from Mendelssohn the approach of the party was too much for pent-up enthusiasm and loud applause drowned out the band. At the raised platform the bride and groom were united in marriage by the simple service read by the Methodist pastor.

Immediately behind the dais rested the prize-winning apples; to the left more apples, to the right, a continuance of exhibits and to the front a sea of faces that gazed on with smiling approbation to the ceremony. Simple, yet artistic, touches of decoration were given the stand itself.

Miss Witt was unattended. She wore a pretty gown of pale blue sarsine silk, cut décolleté and made white lace trim. A white silk veil was fashioned into an automobile head-dress and she carried a bouquet of white asters and lilies of the valley.

Impromptu Banquet Served. Following a long string of congratulations, Mr. and Mrs. Anderson, Dr. and Mrs. Gillilan and others were served an impromptu banquet at the counter where various local concerns have been serving hot biscuits and coffee. At the conclusion of the happy little repast an automobile whisked the couple away.

The wedding was in every way in keeping with the dignity of the occasion.

LYTLE LOSES STATE JOB

STATE VETERINARY JOB GIVEN TO ANOTHER.

Still Sheep Inspector but No Funds Available to Pay Salary.

(Pendleton East Oregonian)

By action of Governor West, taken on recommendation of the state board of health, Prof. J. F. Morel, of the department of animal husbandry at the Oregon agricultural college, has been named as state veterinarian to succeed Dr. W. H. Lytle of this city. The new man is to serve as veterinarian in addition to his work at the college as his public duties will not require all of his attention. The recommendation of the board was made at the session held here during the roundup.

The announcement of the appointment of Morel to be state veterinarian was made at Salem Saturday and the announcement sets forth that the position draws a salary of \$2000 per annum with \$1500 expense money.

In the past Dr. Lytle has been serving as state veterinarian as well as sheep inspector. However, he has been drawing his salary as sheep inspector and not as veterinarian. Consequently the change still leaves him with a salaried position. It appears though, that the sheep commission is virtually without funds. After the veto of the live stock sanitary bill by Governor West the commission was left with but \$1500 upon which to operate for a period of two years. It is understood that this sum has been virtually expended and what the board will do for the future remains in doubt.

According to Dr. Lytle, who is now in the city, he will continue to serve as state sheep inspector and will continue his headquarters in Pendleton. Whether or not any change is contemplated by the board of sheep commissioners he does not know. As now arranged the sheep board will not meet until January.
