The recommendaton of the board was made at the session held hare during the roundup.

The announcement of the appointment of Morel to be state veterinarian was made at Salem Saturday and the announcement sets forth that the position draws a salary of \$2000 per annum with \$1500 expense money.

In the past Dr. Lytle has been serving as state veterinarian as well as sheep inspector. However, he has been drawing his salary as sheep inspector and not as veterinarian. Consequently the change still leaves him with a salaried position. It appears though, that the sheep commission is virtually without funds. After the veto of the live stock sanitary bill by Governor West the commission was I ft with but \$1500 upon which to operate for a period of two years. It is understood that this sum has been virtually expended and what the board will do for the future remains in

According to Dr. Lytle, who is now in the city, he will continue to serve as sttae sheep inspector and will continue his headquarters in Pendleton Whether or not any change is contemplated by the board of sheep commissioners he does not know. As now arranged the sheep bard will not meet until January.
