TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the common council of the city of La Grande on the 5th day of August, 1909, creating improvement district No. 5 and designating Seventh street, as such district and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said common council on the 28th day of June, 1911, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of Seventh street in said improvement district as hereinafter described, by laying thereon macadam and cement curb and gutter, the council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:

DRAMA TERMED WHOLESOME

"JIM, THE PENMAN" SMACKS OF REAL MORALS.

Tri-Star Cast Will Handle Splendid Story in Good Fashion.

To see a wholesome, old-fashioned play revived after the surfeit and flood-tide of plays that leave a nauseous residuum, and after plays that portray merely emotions of corrupt and luxurious idlers, will be particularly interesting to meet with a straight-forward drama, with the vices and virtues plainly labeled, with a clearly pointed moral, and a tale sweetly and naively adorned with honest sentiment, offset by obvious villainy. It would be hard to imagine a cast better adapted to the purpose of this revival. The name of Thurlow Bergen, one of the tri-stars as "Jim, the Penman," who fills the eye, as he fills the ear, very satisfactory; truly a fine figure of Raffles on a scale alternately grand and mean, but always suave, urbane and bonaire, except when overwhelmed and unnerved by the shock of discovery.

Florence Roberts as Mrs. Ralston, the wife, maintains an atmosphere of doom impending. Her aspect and demeanor, more than her words, bespeak the woman "full of presentiments," whose intuitions point the way to dark suspicion tragically confirmed.

The part of Baron Hartfeld, as portrayed by Theodor Roberts is very real. His makeup and gesture, the brutal and cynical suggestion of the cunning eyes, and the mocking laughter, combine in a rare, forceful and convincing enactment of the character of the crafty head of this world-wide band of criminals. This tri-star combination in the revival of this famous old-time drama, with an excellent supporting cast and production, will undoubtedly be one of the few really meritorious treat of the present season, when it will be seen at the Steward Oct. 10th.

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George Westinghouse 65 Years Old.

Pittsburg, Pa., Oct. 6.—George Westinghouse, the celebrated inventor of the air-brake and of numerous important electrical devices, received the congratulations of many friends and business associates today on the occasion of his 65th birthday anniversary. Mr. Westinghouse was born in Schuylke county, New York, in 1846, and gave evidence of his genius at the early age of 15 by inventing a practical rotary engine.
