(A) And the property affected or benefited by said improvement is as follows: The east half of block 56, 61, 64 and 99 and the west 1/2 of blocks 55, 62, 63 and 100, Chaplin's addition to La Grande, Oregon.

Notice is hereby further given that the council will levy a special assessment on all the property affected and benefited by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$6,344.50. That the council will, on the 18th day of October, 1911, meet at the council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock, p. m. to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.

ORIGINAL ADVANCE MAN WOMAN HAS EXPERIENCES

Writer Compares Her Work With Others of Her School.

Dealing with his experiences with the advance man woman for "Jim, the Penman," who was in La Grande yesterday a Tacoma scribe writes entertainingly. Eva Sterling was in La Grande yesterday and those who met her will appreciate the following from the Tacoma newspaper writer:

Out of the thousands of industrious advance agents who ply the country from end to end during the theatrical season there are only three female specimens of the genus that have ever been caught, identified and classified. One of the triad flits ahead of a circus, one cries in a wilderness of skepticism of the beauty of a certain chorus and the real voice of a prima donna that is to follow, and one, Miss Eva Sterling, was in Tacoma yesterday calling up people and chatting over the phone for all the world as though she were not one of the rarest products of the professional field.

It has not been so long since a young woman found herself indicted for questionable conduct if she went to the theatre unaccompanied. As for traveling ahead of a show—my goodness! the dame Grundy's of a generation back would rise up in their graves and protest if they knew such things were. Which only goes to show that the world moves and at the same time places little Miss Sterling in the vanguard of progress—a sort of forerunner in a new profession for her sex.

Had No Travel Stained Look. I met Miss Sterling yesterday afternoon in the Olympus hotel busily engaged in telling some person at the other end of the phone what a splendid show "Jim, the Penman" was to be. When the phone clicked up she turned to me with a smile and I met with one of the surprises of my life. She is a living example of the so-called heretical doctrine that a woman's sphere is the big round globe, and that no matter where she wanders she carries her prettiness and her neatness and her niceness along with her.

Miss Sterling has none of that dressed-on-the-train and wonder-what's-going-to-happen-next air of a woman who finds herself confused by a life of perpetual travel and the difficulty of adjusting herself to an occupation that her grandmother would have thought justified a universal cataclysm. She was smart and fresh and well-groomed. Her voice was fresh and cheery. Her cheeks were pink with good health and the fun of being in the midst of things. "It is an unusual profession for a woman," she assented, when I finally plied her down to the most salient point in her occupation, "but it is not at all an impossible one."

One of Three. "There are three women advance agents on the road in the United States right now—and from the success they are having I shouldn't wonder if the field would be flooded with them next week."

"Of course, my work isn't really the ordinary advance work"—here she stopped and tried to change the subject by saying she was never going to live in the east again because she thought that all the beauties and blessings of prodigal nature had been lavished on the western coast and she intended to be where she could enjoy some of them.

"Yes, it is a lovely country—what did you say your work was? No, the sun does not shine all the time—not quite. Did I understand you to say you do not do the ordinary advance work? Yes, the bay is blue! Sometimes it's blue and sometimes it's not."

What did you say your work—well, we all firmly believe we have over 100,000, but the last census says something less—now see here, Miss Sterling, I want to know what your work is, and I intend to stay here until I do. Simple but Effective.

And then she told. It is very simple—so simple that it seems funny no one ever thought of it before—and it is very effective, so Miss Sterling says. She simply goes from town to town making friends for the company that is to follow. When she arrives in a city she gets a list of prominent men and she calls up their wives by telephone and has a little heart-to-heart talk with them about the company she represents.

"And it's a splendid plan—splendid," she said yesterday. "People, if they like your voice and find that you talk like a lady, are pretty sure to know that the play you represent is the sort of a thing they can take their daughters to."

Oh, the crafty young woman—and, oh, the craftier manager who lets her do it. And, oh, the interesting profession she is opening up for young women with nice voices who talk like ladies.
