AIR CURRENTS.

The Forces That Operate to Make the Wind Blow.

In reference to air currents and the reasons why the wind blows the astronomer royal of England explains that air consists of gaseous particles. all trying to get away from one another, and that under certain couditions they can be compelled to come closer together by contraction or forced to fly further apart by expansion. A quart bottle, for example, holds twentytwo grains of air at the temperature of 70 degrees. If the bottle be cooled by surrounding it with ice the air inside contracts. When this occurs more air rushes in through the bottle's neck. The quart of air now weighs more than twenty-two grains. under the influence of varying degrees of the sun's heat. Where the heat is greatest the air is made lighter 'and expands. Where the heat is least the air is unexpanded and heavy. Both the hot and the cold air have weight, but the cold, being the heavier, is drawn more effectively down to the ground. In doing so it drives the lighter air up out of its way, just as a lump of lead dropped into a pail of water forces some of the water upward. If the earth were equally warm at every part and continued at a constant temperature wind could not exist. It "blows" because of heat and gravitation. In other words, air moves from the place where its weight or pressure is most toward the place where its weight or pressure is least.
