LOVE AFFAIR PROMPTED ACT

BELIEVED JEALOUS JAPANESE SHOT ARTIST.

Two Bullets Took Effect—Japanese Is Missing Today, Say Employers.

Infatuation between exponents of the white and oriental races led to the shooting of a man named Harry B. Lee about 9 o'clock last night at the corner of Third and Adams, think officials today, and though the victim of the shooting is in the hospital suffering considerable pain, there is no trace of the Japanese who is said to have opened fire because of heart pang over the capers cut by a local girl. It developed today that a local Japanese boy working in one of the hosteries in the city had been giving his money freely to a girl of this city and had developed what is popularly known as a heart case over the girl. In fact, it seems that this particular Oriental had been in love with the girl in question for some time and though it is not known that he was encouraged in his love making, the fact that he was infatuated with her seems to be pretty generally known. It is this that led up to the shooting, it is believed.

White Rival Shot Down.

Lee since coming to town had been engaged in cartoon and picture card making and it seems that the Japanese looked upon favors cast on the white girl by the art man as cause for heart aches that grew in propensities until they had to vent themselves through the muzzle of a revolver. The climax came last night when the Jap met Lee and the girl on Adams avenue near Third street. Lee says he had every reason to believe that the Jap had a gun in his hand while approaching the couple and Lee called to him to move on. The revolver commenced to spit lead as an answer to the command.

The Japanese who is said to have spent money and lavished love freely on his white soulmate is missing today and from descriptions given of the assailant it is clear that there may be some connection with the love affair and the shooting last night.

Two Bullets Went True.

The man was shot twice, though it is said four or five shots were fired at close range. One bullet took effect in the leg just above the knee and the second one a trifle higher up, between the hip and the knee. It seems the man behind the gun aimed low and did not likely have any intention of actually killing his enemy.

Drs. N. Mollitor and C. T. Bacon report today that the wounds, which were dressed by these gentlemen at the Grande Ronde hospital, are not necessarily critical and barring unforeseen developments should heal speedily.

Meeting of Rail Commissioners.

Washington, Oct. 10.—So many important topics are slated for discussion at the 23rd annual meeting of the National Association of Railway Commissioners, which began here today, that the sessions will continue five days instead of three as heretofore. The convention is composed of the members of the interstate commerce commission and the railway commissioners of the various states. The president is R. Hudson Durr, of Florida. The present meeting promises to be of much importance, especially in view of the great question of whether the states have the power to regulate intrastate rates raised by the Judge Sanborn decision. The commissioners also will discuss railway capitalization, car service, demurrage, telephone and telegraph rates, express service and express rates, and shippers' claims on common carriers.

New Normal School Dedicated.

Johnson City, Tenn., Oct. 10.—The East Tennessee State normal school, which has just been opened for its first term, was formally dedicated today with a program of addresses delivered by United States Commissioner of Education P. P. Claxton, President Brown Ayres of the University of Tennessee, President P. L. Jones of the Middle Tennessee State normal school, and several other well known educators.

MONEY FOUND ON DEAD BODY

WILLIAMS, TELOCASET MAN, HAD FUNDS WHEN KILLED.

Mystery Surrounding Death to Be Probed This Evening.

A one-hundred dollar bill, wrapped with great care in a long strip of paper and concealed in a tin match box that had itself been flattened out by carwheels, and lumber checks amounting to about \$200 were found on the remains of James Williams, a Telocaset homesteader who was found dead near the siding at Telocaset two days ago. The remains were brought to La Grande last night and the inquest planned for today had been delayed until tonight pending the arrival of witnesses. The finding of the money removes probability of robbery and subsequent murder and makes it more likely than ever that the verdict of the coroner's inquest will be accidental killing by a train at Telocaset.

The man is not well known at Telocaset but what the people there do know of him is nothing but complimentary, it is said. How he came to be run down, if he was killed by the train, is mysterious. It was not supposed that he had any money and it was only by the merest chance that Undertaker Carr and Coroner Bacon found the money this afternoon.

LORIMER QUIZ IS UNDERWAY

STATE SENATOR FIRST OF 20 WITNESSES CALLED.

Solon Said He Was Promised Power in Politics to Vote Eight.

Chicago, Oct. 10.—The Lorimer investigation was resumed today with 20 witnesses ready to take the stand. It is expected the hearing will last a month. State Senator Frank Lande was the first witness and said several persons had approached him and had promised him more official power if he would vote for Lorimer despite the fact that he was pledged for Hopkins.

Borden Sworn In.

Ottawa, Oct. 10.—The new Canadian conservative cabinet, headed by Premier Borden, was sworn in at noon today.

HOTEL OWNERS PUT IN JAIL

FORTLAND PAIR ACCUSED OF FIRING HOTEL.

Sleeping Occupants Threatened With Death by Incendiary Fire.

Portland, Oct. 10.—Charged with arson in connection with a fire of incendiary origin in eight rooms of the Sorey hotel in South Portland this morning, which endangered the lives of 20 sleeping occupants, F. E. Ulin and wife have been arrested.

They had recently acquired the hotel and insured its contents for \$1,500. The fire was set in bedclothes of eight rooms.

Lincoln Memorial Unveiled

Council Bluffs, Ia., Oct. 10.—Many distinguished veterans attending the 41st annual reunion here of the Society of the Army of the Tennessee took part this afternoon in exercises at the unveiling of a memorial to Abraham Lincoln. Gen. Grenville M. Dodge presided and among the speakers are Gen. Frederick D. Grant, Bishop Samuel Fallows, and Miss Harriet Lake of Independence, Ia., representing the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Oldest Missionary Society Meets.

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 10.—The American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions, the oldest missionary society in the United States, began its 101st convention here today and will continue in session until Friday. The attendance includes about 500 prominent members of the Congregational communion. The annual report of Treasurer Frank H. Wiggin of Boston shows that for the year ending Aug. 31 the total receipts of the society were \$1,032,025 and the total expenditures \$1,030,604.

Heike Must Go to Jail.

New York, Oct. 10.—Charles Heike, the sugar magnate and former secretary of the American Sugar Refining company, lost his appeal in the United States circuit court of appeals against his jail sentence of eight months for weight customs frauds. Unless the supreme court intervenes he must go immediately to jail.

Boston Structure Collapses.

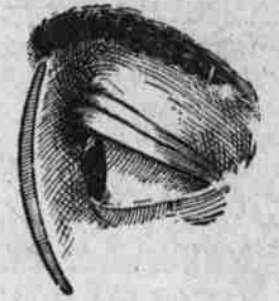
Boston, Oct. 10.—A six story building at Hanover and Battery streets collapsed at noon today. Six were killed.
