GOVERNMENT AID NEEDED.

Road Without State Aid Useless to Alaskan Says Seward Senator

Seattle, Oct. 11.—E. J. Barnes, representative of the Seward Alaska Commission, today enroute to Washington, D. C., he will urge federal aid in the building of a railroad to the Matanuska coal fields.

"Federal aid leaving bill that does not provide government aid to a railroad is worthless for Alaska," declared Barnes. "We want the government to guarantee the bonds. One advantage to the government would be the reduction in annual expenditures for Pacific mail. A saving of \$750,000 annually can be accomplished by drawing coal from the Matanuska fields."
