FIRST AID TO HURT TRAINMEN

SOUTHERN PACIFIC INSTALLS KIT ON TRAINS.

These "First Aids" Are to Be Found on All Trains for the Crews.

San Francisco, Oct. 13.—(Special)—In an effort to minimize fatal results from what first appear to be only minor accidents, the Southern Pacific company, through its chief surgeon, Dr. F. K. Almsworth, has ordered installed on the baggage cars, combination cars and cabooses, what are known universally as "first aid" packages. Ever since the railroads of the country first became interested in first aid work, the Southern Pacific trains have been equipped with "first aid" kits, but these were so large that when one was opened only one or two were used and several were left to become dirty and unfit for medical use.

The "first aid" packages contain only sufficient bandages and dressings for one wound and a sufficient number of packages are placed in each car to take care of a large number of wounds should it happen that any great number of persons incur injuries at the same time. Danger from train accidents, which has been minimized to such an extent during the last few years by modern equipment and safety devices, is further diminished by having these "first aid" packages at hand at all times, and practically all train crews have become skilled in rendering the first aid work.

History of the Sardine.

The sardine has been honored with a history, the writer being no less a personage than a member of the Societe Academique of Nantes. The sardine in the early days was brought in in small boats. Then came a police ordinance in 1738 in the interest of the poorer classes against the monopolist. Owing to the police ordinance the sardine was a source of livelihood to the Bretons. Joseph Cillin, whose name is still revered in Nantes, first prepared the fish with oil. His venture was a great success, and he had many imitators. In 1835 there was something like a crisis in the sardine industry. Millet, who was the chief curer, had his factory indicted as a nuisance, but the difficulty was overcome by removing it from the center of the town to the shore. Although the fame of the sardine was firmly established, it was only in 1855 that it received its apotheosis. Then it was shown in the Paris exhibition.—London Globe.

PIERCE GIVEN JURY VERDICT

WIN FROM SUN INSURANCE COMPANY.

Fifteen Hundred Dollars at Issue Are Awarded to Senator.

Circuit Judge J. W. Knowles this morning directed a verdict in favor of Mr. Pierce for \$1,500 for damages sustained in the destructive fire of a year or so ago when the Pierce warehouse was fired by a spark from the branch line engine, entailing a loss of more than \$20,000. The Sun Insurance company carried a policy of \$1,500 on the warehouse and contents but claimed that because the warehouse was partially on the O. R. & N. right of way, the insurance company was not held liable; claimed that Mr. Pierce stored hay when this was in violation of the policy stipulations. These two contentions were offset by witnesses to prove that the local agent was aware of these conditions when the policy was in effect. The court ordered a verdict for Mr. Pierce.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the common council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, on the 5th day of August, 1909 creating improvement district No. 1, and designating Adams avenue as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said common council on the 6th day of September, 1911, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of Adams avenue in said improvement district as hereinafter described, by laying thereon cement walks on both sides, the council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made: that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:

All that portion of Adams avenue, from the west curb line of First street, to the east curb line of Oak street.

(A) And the property affected or benefited by said improvement is as follows:

Lots 1 and 16, block 3; lots 1 and 16, block 6; lots 8 and 9, block 5; lots 8 and 9, block 4; Grandy's 2nd addition to La Grande, Oregon.
