Twirler Uses Catcher's Left Shoulder as Point of Aim. Here's the interesting side of the reason why Lack Lapp catches Jack Coombs better than any other backstop, and the iron man himself is the sponsor for the tale.
"Without Lapp catching me," said Jack, "my high fast one is not worth a tinker's expetive. Now, here's the reason: 'I don't look at the batter when I'm pitching. I gauge my chucks by Lapp's left shoulder. When I want to cut loose with a high fast one I look at that shoulder and let her go. Now, with Ira Thomas working with me I can't work this, and I'll tell you why. He is so much taller than Lapp that when I look at his shoulder to gauge my throw the ball is sky high, and that gets me mad. That's the reason I like to see Lapp in front of me when I am pitching.'"

LOUD ACCLAIM AT 'FRISCO

NATIONAL ANTHEM SUNG, GUNS BOOM AND BUGLES PLAY.

President Taft Drives Silver Spade Into the Earth, Opening Expo.

San Francisco, Oct. 14.—Symbolical of the scope and magnificence of the Panama Pacific exposition, ground at the stadium this afternoon was broken by President Taft with celebrated ceremony. Flanked by hundreds of representative men and women of California, the glitter of the navy and military, he drove the silver spade into the earth. The bugles sounded and the exposition flag rose while the artillery boomed, bands played and the national anthem was sung amid cheers. Governor Johnson, Mayor McCarthy and President Moore of the exposition and President Taft spoke.

DEAN JUSTICE HARLAN DEAD

DEAN OF U S SUPREME COURT PASSES AWAY

DEATH COMES AT EARLY HOUR TODAY; FAMILY PRESENT

Served for Thirty-Four Years Without Exception—Makes It Necessary for President Taft to Appoint Another Justice, the Fifth in His Term—Has Been Ailing Since Monday.

Washington, Oct. 14.—Associate Justice John M. Harlan of the United States here at 8:15 this morning. Death was caused by acute bronchitis which began with a cold Monday. Owing to the extreme age—he was 78—death was expected and the family was at his bedside.

Justice Harlan was dean of the United States justices, his term being the longest in history—34 years with no exception.

His death makes it necessary for President Taft to make a fifth selection for the supreme court which will make a majority on the tribunal which Taft has selected.

OPINIONATED JUROR FOUGHT

DEFENSE WILL NOT ALLOW NELSON TO TAKE SEAT

DEFENSE ANGERED BECAUSE WITNESSES SEE DEFENDANTS

Struggle Between Defense and Prosecution over Opinionated Juror Question Continued Today in Los Angeles—Judge May Remove Nelson for Cause.

Los Angeles, Oct. 14.—The fight to determine whether an opinionated juror shall be permitted to try McNamara if he is willing to say that he can lay aside that opinion, was continued today. It seems certain that Venetian Nelson, the first drawn for the jury, will not remain. Judge Bordwell is expected to excuse him for cause but if he won't the defense will exercise a peremptory challenge.

The defense attorneys were angered today by the acts of the prosecution which is bringing in witnesses and allowing them to look over McNamara in the court room before they are put on the stand.

Deputy District Attorney Horton says: "In a nutshell our contention is that the defendant is not entitled to a safe jury but is entitled only to a fair and impartial one." He argued that no intelligent man could read about the case and not form an opinion.

Horton characterized Nelson as a fair, impartial juror. The McNamara trial was adjourned at noon today until Monday morning. Judge McMurt for the defense said he could not accept Nelson because he was biased.

Walsh Is Out.

Leavenworth, Oct. 14.—Confirmation of the Walsh pardon was received today. Walsh will spend his declining years with his son and other relatives, reporting from time to time to the nearest federal judge. Walsh was denied a pardon by Taft last year. He left the prison today.

YOUNG ROESCH HERO OF NAVY

RELATIVE OF LA GRANDE FOLKS SAVES FOUR COMPANIONS

Plunges Into Bay and Drags Out Four From Seething Waters.

San Francisco, Oct. 14.—Midshipman Herbert Roesch from Pendleton, Ore., and a relative of Julius Roesch at La Grande, who is on the cruiser Colorado, is the hero of the Pacific cruiser fleet today. Last night he saved four sailors from drowning when a launch from the Virginia struck a whaleboat containing 38 marines from the Maryland in a fog. The whaleboat sunk.

All launches in the vicinity answered the alarm and Roesch plunged into the bay and hauled out four singlehanded. J. R. Charlis, a musician is missing and is believed to have perished.

DYNASTY NOW ON LAST LEG

MANY BIG TOWNS IN HANDS OF REBEL CHINESE

NANKING AND OTHERS SET AFIRE BY CAPTIVORS

Situation in China Grows Worse Daily and Manchu Dynasty of Centuries Will Soon Be Overpowered, It Is Feared—Peking Ready to Send Royal Troops to Fight Revolt.

Tokio, Oct. 14.—With the Nanking rebellion spreading rapidly through China, Peking dispatches today say the capitol's fall into rebel hands is hourly imminent. It is believed in Peking the Manchu dynasty is about ready to go. The cities of Nanking, and Kail-seng have been captured and are burning and the populous provinces of Sechuen, Kwang, Tung, Hunan, Hupeh, Hoan, Kain and Kainsan are controlled by the revolutionists.

In Peking conditions are growing worse. Three divisions of the army are being mobilized there to oppose the revolutionists in the field.

Prime Mover in America.

Denver, Oct. 14.—Somewhere between Denver and San Francisco today is Dr. Sun Yat Sen, alleged to be the real editor of the Chinese revolution and prospective president of the new anti-Manchu republic in China, who has a price of \$100,000 on his head. He left Denver Thursday night with the idea of getting back to China as rapidly as possible.

American Chinese Send Help.

San Francisco, Oct. 14.—Excitement over the Chinese revolt against the Manchu dynasty has resulted in the immediate sending to China of \$20,000 and larger sums are being collected among the Chinese to send soon.

NIBLER IS FINED.

Attorney Appears for Defendant and Fine Is Placed by Judge.

Jack Nibler was today fined \$25 and costs as a result of pleading guilty by attorney to the charge of carrying concealed weapons. The fine was the outgrowth of the "rumor" between Mr. Nibler and some strikers a few days ago when Nibler pulled two revolvers and warned the strikers not to come near him.

Census Frauder Missing.

Tacoma, Oct. 14.—That W. A. McKenzie, the government census agent, was "tipped off" and disappeared from Spokane is the charge made by Deputy Marshal Crosby today. McKenzie was indicted for census frauds last Wednesday.

NEW ROAD RECORD SET.

National Car Goes 151 Miles in Record Time Today.

Santa Monica, Oct. 14.—In a National car, Charles Merz, won the heavy car event in the Santa Monica road race; time for 151 miles was 2:02.38, a world's record. Bert Dingley in a Pope-Hartford was second. Twenty thousand witnessed the contests.

Little New in War Gam.

London, Oct. 14.—In a semi-official announcement from Rome it is said the Italian forces will attack Smyrna and Salonika if the Italians in Smyrna are molested. The Tripoli situation is unchanged.

London, Oct. 14.—The continuance of the Turko-Italian war depends upon the result of the struggle being waged between the Young Turks and the conservatives in parliament convened at Constantinople today.
