**THOMAS ROUP**  
**PASSES AWAY**

**JOSEPH COMMERCIALLY PAYS A TRIBUTE TO LATE CITIZEN.**

Funeral Services Held Last Saturday Afternoon at Joseph.

Joseph, Ore., Oct. 14.—(Special)—The funeral services of Thomas Roup were held today at the First M. E. church, same being conducted by Rev. J. W. Miller. In honor of the deceased all business was suspended here. The remains were buried in the Prairie Creek cemetery near Joseph.

Mr. Roup was born May 3rd, 1828, in Livingston county, New York, where he received his education and grew to manhood's estate. He remained at home until he was 24 years of age, when his adventurous spirit led him to the prairie of Iowa, where he spent 15 years at farming. After this time he went to Montana and located at the mouth of Bear Gulch, on the Mullen road, where he kept a hotel for some time, after which he returned to Missouri and tilled the land for several years. In 1874 he turned westward and located in Wallowa county, Oregon, on the place that he owned at the time of his death.

The marriage of Mr. Roup and Miss Nancy Henry occurred in 1852. He is survived by his wife and three children: Loretta, wife of H. S. Hunt, in this county, E. T. Roup and W. J. Roup both of this county. Mr. Roup was very active in the defense of the settlers during the Indian wars of 1878, and has ever taken a commendable interest in the affairs of the county. During his stay in Montana he was justice of the peace, and in 1878 was appointed by the court justice of the peace for Wallowa county. He was a prominent figure in church circles, both in his early days and up to the time of his death.
