FRIGANZA IS WELL LIKED

TROUPE CRISP WITH NEWNESS AND NEW STUNTS.

Comedienne and Her Colleagues Entertain Large Audience Here.

Trixie Friganza with a trunkful of new songs, new stunts, new costumes, new scenery and new girls—gauging by the yardstick of age—came to the Steward footlights last night and pleased a big audience with their newness and new things—and a sprinkling of pretty girls.

Despite the handicap of hoarseness, the comedienne labored bravely and earnestly and was as rollickingly funny and as delightfully fat—if people are permitted to be "delightfully fat"—as ever. Her severe cold prevented her from singing with usual skill the famous song about her avoirdupois but she found joy in "kidding herself" about it with a charm that was the greater because it was original. Her "Don't Forget the Number" song, the novelty imitations of imitations, and her other numbers were near perfection; her appearance was joyfully pleasing and her gowns were gorgeously and expensively beautiful.

But Miss Friganza, in all her plump jollity, was not the whole performance. There was nothing top-heavy; honors were well distributed. Admitting that "comparisons are odious," there were those who liked the work of Kathryn Brown Palmer better than that of the fair Trixie; others who thought William Edmunds, as Cobasso, the tenor with the lost voice, was more enjoyable than both, and still others who found greatest delight in the splendid male chorus and the lively work of a sprightly group of singing and dancing La Salle theatre girls. After all it was merely a matter of taste and the production was varied enough to supply satisfaction to the requirements of the most exacting.

Miss Palmer's "Annette" was ridiculously amusing; it was one of those roles which provoke prolonged hilarity. Her number, "I Want a Man," was one of the big features of the performance; her work was splendid.

The Cobasso of William Edmunds was great. In the role of a tenor with a lost voice which could have degenerated easily into a cheap burlesque, he surpassed and by his powers of repression displayed the artistry which will not permit "overdoing." His description of the baseball game was immense and to the demands of an extremely difficult role he made flawless response which won for him an admiring local following.

ENGINEER SAVES TRAIN.

Derailer Left Open Near Gibbon and Train Had Narrow Escape.

(Pendleton Live Wire.)
What might have resulted in a disastrous accident yesterday morning was averted by the engineer on No. 6, an eastbound passenger train. While approaching Gibbon he applied the air brakes before reaching a derailer just in the nick of time to save the whole train from jumping off the rails. The derailer had been carelessly left open. Fortunately the train was running at a slow rate of speed and only a sleeper left the track. This was abandoned and the train proceeded on its way east after being delayed but a few minutes.

A wrecking crew from Pendleton was dispatched immediately to Gibbon. The car was replaced on the track and brought back to the city. No passengers were in the derailed car at the time of the derailment.

Engineer Wright Buried.

The last sad rites were said today over the body of Jack Wright, the engineer who died in this city Saturday morning as a result of injuries sustained when he fell under a moving train at the local depot. Interment was made in the Walla Walla cemetery at 3 o'clock. The coffin was followed to its last resting place by two members each from the Knights of Pythias, the Elks and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the deceased having been a member of all three organizations.—Pendleton East Oregonian.
