## Elderly Englishman the Second Man to Swim English Channel

WILLIAM BURGESS, the second man to swim the English channel, is past fifty years of age, and he succeeded in accomplishing the feat on his sixteenth attempt, his first effort being made in 1904. Burgess is a native of Yorkshire, England, though he has lived in Paris for more than twenty years earning a living as a blacksmith. In his long swim he was in the water twenty-two hours and thirty-five minutes. His body was well greased before he entered the water, and during the swim he partook of food at frequent intervals. He was almost exhausted by the swim in the water, which was at 65 degrees F., the highest it has been in a decade. He was accompanied by a motorboat, and it is estimated that he covered sixty miles owing to the baffling tides, though the actual distance from shore to shore was only a trifle more than a third of that. Burgess says that his sufferings were terrible and that he was out of his head much of the time, being afflicted with horrible hallucinations. He now says that he believes he can swim across the channel twice and that he will make the attempt if a prize of \$50,000 is offered.

## ROUNDUP OF NIGHT SINGERS

TWO IN JAIL AND OTHERS ARE ROUNDED UP.

Complaint of Residents Brings Police to the Scene at Night.

More than a half-dozen young men were rounded up and two of them jailed late last night as the outgrowth of a complaint coming from the residents living near the skating rink on Washington avenue. Acting Chief of Police McLachlin answered the call in person and before he got to the rink met a crowd of a half dozen, either singing or attempting to sing with results that were obnoxious to the community at large. One or two of them were intoxicated and the leader of the noise-makers was placed in jail and is there this afternoon. Another of the crowd wanted to keep the leader company and he, too, is behind the steel bars. Names of the young men are withheld from publication out of sheer regard for their reputations otherwise unimpaired. The officers had instructions to close the skating rink unless the noise was cut short, but as the crowd principally responsible had moved away from the territory of the rink at the time they were rounded up the rink management was not molested. The complaint against the skating rink is not so much relative to the disturbance from the dances and skating direct as from crowds that congregated without the place and keep their hideous yells and songs going lustily most of the fore part of the night on various occasions. It is believed the roundup last night will, for the present at least, cause more consideration for the peace and dignity of the city at large and especially some consideration for residents in that part of the city who are trying to sleep with the bedlam of noises ringing from the street.

Sleeps in Theatre Box.

Unlocking the door to the Arcade theatre in some way, Steve McLoughlin, for several months rusticated about the city, last night made his way to the theatre box and proceeded to get a full night's sleep. He was arrested this morning but as he had not broken in with intent to steal could be charged with nothing more serious than vagrancy.

Two ordinary drunk and disorderly charges were preferred against Frank Hany and John Sullivan this morning.

**What the Death Mask Shows.** The value of a plaster cast as a portrait of the dead or living face cannot for a moment be questioned. It must of necessity be absolutely true to nature. In "The Duel in Herne Wood" he makes the story open with the receipt of a telegram, and the period is 1817, when twenty years had to elapse before the first telegraphic wire was laid. Three of the characters also talk of "taking the express train to London" in defiance of the fact that the first railway to London was not opened till 1825.

Enemies Say Madero's Election Was Forced, and Not Legal.
