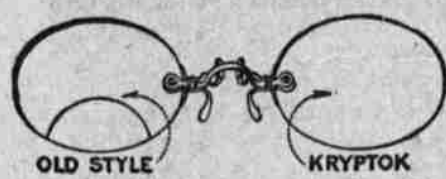

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"BABY MINE" REAL COMEDY

ATTRACTION AT STEWARD SAT-
URDAY LAUGHABLE.

Original New York Troupe Coming to Present Comedy.

"Laugh and grow fat." This is the universal opinion of everybody who has seen Wm. A. Brady's play of a thousand laughs, "Baby Mine," the product of Margaret Mayo's pen, which will be seen here for the first time at the Steward opera house on Saturday, Oct. 21st.

This is just the sort of a play to turn tears into laughter, and to give life a rosy hue—so sayeth one of England's most famous critics, where "Baby Mine" is now running at Sir Charles Wyndham's Criterion theatre, in London, and it should be borne in mind, that over in Londontown, they have heretofore held a strong prejudice against plays of American manufacture, so this superlative praise in favor of "Baby Mine" is all the more remarkable.

The Story of the Play.

"Baby Mine," unlike many a so-called fun play, gets hold of the funny bone of its audience at the very outset and proceeds to tickle it for two and a half hours, not moderately, nor modestly, but bolsterously and strenuously, until the audience fairly shouts with glee. A young married couple are quarreling at the very beginning of the performance. In a towering rage, the young husband leaves the house and remains away for three months after which period the clever young wife makes up her mind that woman's ingenuity should be sufficient to bring back her wandering better half. The wife consults a friend who opines that the wife wire the absent husband that he is the proud father of a lusty infant, and the friend volunteers to hire a baby for the occasion. A child is secured for the purpose, but the husband appears on the scene sooner than expected, and even before the child is brought into the house. In the meantime the real mother of the baby is seized with remorse, and demands her child back.

Again the friend rushes off to get another baby and it is in the subsequent complications incident to the arrival and rescue of this child that the complications take on an amazingly amusing aspect, with never a suggestion of a letup. Throughout the entire three acts the fun of "Baby" is of the clean, wholesome, cheerful sort, with never the least bit of suggestiveness to mar the enjoyment of the performance.

Manager Brady has sent to this city most of the company that played "Baby Mine" in New York all of last season.

New Masonic Temple Dedicated.

Houghton, Mich., Oct. 18.—The magnificent Masonic temple recently completed in this city was dedicated in "due form" today, the ceremonies being more elaborate and imposing than any before seen here. The principal streets were decorated with flags and Masonic emblems and hundreds of members of the fraternity representing lodges throughout the copper country were in attendance. The dedicatory services were conducted by the Grande Lodge officers in accordance with the Masonic ritual. The exercises were followed by a public reception and inspection of the new edifice.

Suffragists Gather in Louisville.

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 18.—Prominent woman suffragists are already arriving in considerable numbers and committee meetings are being held in preparation for the annual convention of the National American Woman's Suffrage association, which will be formally opened here tomorrow. The convention this year promises to be the most notable in the history of the equal rights movement. A fine array of talent has been engaged to address the various meetings, consisting of prominent men and women who have become famous for their devotion and labor along different lines of human activity. The indications are that every state will be represented at the convention.

Lots 1 and 16, block 3; lots 1 and 16, block 6; lots 8 and 9, block 5; lots 8 and 9, block 4; Grandy's 2nd addition to La Grande, Oregon.

Notice is hereby further given that the council will levy a special assessment on all property affected and benefited by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$461.65. That the council will, on the 18th day of October, 1911, meet at the council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m., to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.
