Mrs. Kinzie was born in Iowa 74 years ago and crossed the plains with her husband, Davis Kinzie, in 1862, settling in the Grande Ronde valley. Seven years ago she and Mr. Kinzie moved to Portland and have since made their home with their son. Mrs. Kinzie is survived by a widow, and eight children, as follows: Mrs. Kitty Grey, of Baker, Ore.; Mrs. Emma Shea, of La Grande, Ore.; Mrs. Fritz Raab, Mrs. Libbie Causgriff, Charles, William, Harry and Edwin Kinzie, all of Portland.
