BUTTER FAT 1 CENT HIGHER

LOCAL CREAMERIES SOURCE OF PROFIT TO RANCHERS.

Growing Business Proves Lactative Adjunct to Farm Industries.

Butter fat went up one cent today—an item that will interest the dairymen of Union county. Local creameries are paying 34 cents a pound for the valuable base of butter today and the difference in prices will make a material difference on the scores of butter fat checks that local creameries send out monthly.

The increase in size and quantity of these butter fat checks has been marvellous during the past few years. The business has been taken up as a profitable adjunct to ranch life, and with two creameries here to use up the supply as fast as it is presented on the market, the ranchers find that they as well as eastern farmers can realize a neat profit from the milk and cream business in addition to raising wheat and alfalfa.
