## LEAGUERS WILL MEET AT ELGIN

### GENERAL MANAGER RUDD PLANS BIG PROGRAM TOMORROW.

Various Smaller Conventions Point Way to Big Baker Meeting.

Rev. J. H. Rudd, of Island City, is managing a series of Epworth League conventions this fall in different parts of Eastern Oregon. Last week he had one in John Day, this week he has one in Elgin and next week he goes to Huntington. All these are preliminary to the great central one he is planning for Baker.

Tomorrow morning the one in Elgin opens and will have delegates from all parts of Union and Willowa counties. After a preparatory session in the afternoon there will be a social function for the evening. Addresses of welcome will be made by Attorney H. E. Dixon, local president, Pastor Trueblood and Mayor Weatherspoon; to these a response is to be made by Dr. Gillilan. This is to be followed by a spirited address by the Alicoel pastor, Rev. H. A. Hamilton, on "Provisional Preparation for Present Day Civilization." This will be worth the hearing for Mr. Hamilton is both a thinker and an orator. Throughout the next day, Friday, the delegates will be permitted to hear addresses and papers from Rev. J. M. Dressler of Imbler, Mrs. H. C. Vincke of La Grande, Mrs. Playle of Alicoel, Rev. A. Coslett of Cove, Hon. J. A. Burleigh of Enterprise, Miss Alpha Christy of Joseph, Miss Fannie McKennon of Union, Rev. A. W. James of Willowa, Rev. W. S. Miller of Flora. Dr. Gillilan will preach the closing sermon in the evening.

Beating his way on the trucks of an O-W. station for help, announcing in excited tones that there was a hobo on the trucks who refused to give up his seat.

Officer Hughes was just starting for dinner, but the summons to duty made him forget the pangs of hunger and he started for the depot, examining the chambers of his "shooting iron" and loosening his billy club as he ran. He was somewhat chagrined when he found that the hobo was nothing more formidable than a porcupine, but before he had finished his work of ejection, he was wishing that it had been a handily bold or villainous desperado instead.

The little animal fought for a free right with determination worthy of a squatter defending his homestead. Repeatedly he was battered over the head with a 200 pound scantling and knocked him from his perch but just as often did he remount the trucks and raise his quills in defiance, and it was not until the life had been beaten out of him that he gave up the fight. His limp body was carried off in triumph and his conquerors, unmindful of his valiant fight, began despoiling the fallen hero of the rich armor which had made his defeat difficult.
