GRANGERS GIVE TAFT SUPPORT

PARAMOUNT PLANK IN TAFT'S PLATFORM UPHELD.

Local Grangers Urge Senators to Vote for World Peace Treaty.

Aligning itself with President William H. Taft's paramount campaign issue, and urging Oregon's representatives in congress to vote for Taft's pet measure—a measure on which he is standing as a chief plank in the republican platform; made so since the collapse of the reciprocity policy—the Blue Mountain grange has gone on record as heartily agreeing with the president in the latter's efforts for world peace.

At the last session of the Blue Mountain grange the following set of resolutions were unanimously adopted and a copy of same sent to each of the United States Senators from Oregon, with the request that he use his greatest efforts to forward the ratification of the therein mentioned treaties, by the senate.

We are of the opinion and firmly believe:

That war is unnecessary, barbarous and uncivilized;

That the majority of the people of the world are educated and christianized enough to desire and demand a cessation of the horrible practice of human slaughter, to gain ends that can be more satisfactorily gained by arbitration;

That the cost of war is often, and nearly always, far greater than the gain thereby;

That the sufferings and horrors of warfare are, and ought to be, things of the remote days of savagery, things that should not be tolerated by a civilized, educated, christian nation;

That, whereas, ignorance in the past has supported and excused the theory and practice of war, there is now in this enlightened day and age, no possible excuse for supporting this barbarous and unchristian practice;

And, whereas, there is now before the United States senate, certain arbitration treaties, which, if passed and ratified in their original form, without change or expunction of clause 3 or article III, or in any other part or manner, will be a decided advance towards cessation of wars and a world wide peace;

And, whereas, the omission or expunction of clause 3 of article III from the treaties, will weaken and impair these treaties in their most vital and important parts;

Therefore, Be it Resolved, that we, the members of this Blue Mountain grange, in regular session, this twenty-first day of October, in the year 1911, do unanimously favor the step towards world wide peace, as it is set forth in the arbitration treaties now before the United States senate;

That we unanimously wish and desire the ratification of these treaties in their original form, that is, without clause 3 of article III, or any other clause or article or any part thereof, being expunged from, cut out of or left out of these treaties;

That we heartily agree with the president of these United States, in his views concerning and referring to these arbitration treaties, as set forth in his speeches and message.

President Taft has initiated these treaties, now in the senate, where they are awaiting ratification in their original form, or the rejection of certain parts, principally clause 3 of article III, and ratification in that shape. If they are ratified and given to the world with these certain parts cut out, they will be of no good, but on the other hand will brand the United States as a cowardly nation afraid to stand up to an agreement that she would like to force upon some other nation.

You may not agree with President Taft's political views and I may not agree with them, but upon this point we can and ought to agree: that wars and the horrors thereof have no place in the present christian civilization and enlightenment of this twentieth century.

Every church, club, lodge, union or other organization that is or has a claim to christianity or civilization ought to send resolutions or communications to their senators at Washing-

ton, urging them to act and speak favorably upon the ratification of these treaties in the original form.

PLANTING FRY IN LAKE

GAME WARDEN NOW AT WORK AT MINAM.

Big Consignment of Trout to Be Shipped and Planted at Joseph Lake

T. J. Craig, chief deputy game warden, this week began transferring between 250,000 and 300,000 trout fry from the Minam hatchery in Wallowa county into Wallowa lake. The work will occupy about a week, says a Portland paper.

The annual distribution of trout fry began several weeks ago, with the transfer of some 300,000 fry from the Bonneville hatchery to different streams of Baker and Umatilla counties. The distribution of fry in the Deschutes river will begin as soon as the work of stocking Wallowa lake is finished. The work of stocking the valley streams will be taken up. It is not thought that the game authorities will be able to undertake work in the Willamette valley, however, before November 15th.

E. S. Catron, chief clerk in the game warden's office, who is conducting the office in the absence of Warden Finley in the east, says an effort will be made to supply all points from which requests have been received, but that he does not know how far the supply on hand will go. The number of young trout transplanted will be about the same as last year. A number of improvements and enlargements are to be made in the hatcheries with a view to increase the supply next year. The trout are transferred in 10-gallon cans.
