LUITPOLD, 91, SERIOUSLY ILL

REAL RULER OF BAVARIA IN
CRITICAL STATE.

"Grand Old Man" of Bavaria May Not
Recover From Illness.

Berlin, Oct. 25.—The serious illness of Prince Luitpold, the regent of Bavaria, is a cause for considerable anxiety in official circles in Berlin as well as in Munich. In view of his great age—he is now in his 91st year—it is feared that the prince will not recover from his present attack of acute bronchitis.

The passing of Bavaria's "Grand Old Man" will be sincerely regretted by all who have the welfare of the German empire at heart. For a quarter of a century, Luitpold has been the actual sovereign of Bavaria. The insane king, Otto, his nephew, has been all this time under restraint. Prince Luitpold, a man of solid abilities, has carried on the business of the state to the general satisfaction of all. Considering the constant jealousy with which Bavaria, the second German state in population and resources, regards Prussia, the regent has had a delicate task at times, but he has always been equal to it, and has influence has been exerted for the preservation of that "unity" which is essential to the well-being of Germany.

Prince Luitpold has led an active and eventful life ever since 1835, when he began his active service in the army. He fought against the Prussians in the war of 1866 and with them against France five years later. It was he who overcame the hesitation of his eccentric nephew King Louis, and induced him to invite King William of Prussia to assume the crown and title of German emperor. Luitpold was chosen by the rulers of the various German states to submit to King William the German imperial crown, and ever since that time Luitpold has never for a moment wavered in his loyalty to the German empire.

More than 20 years after the establishment of the empire the divergence of views between the two sections of northern and southern Germany became so pronounced that the Hohenzollerns felt the need of placating southern German sentiment by some conspicuous appointment that appealed to its pride. When in 1894 Prince Hohenlohe, a distinguished Bavarian, was called to the chancellorship of the empire, the appointment was less a tribute to his high abilities than a concession to Bavaria and the neighboring states in the south. Bavaria was proud of Prince Hohenlohe and his appointment gratified both national

and progressive sentiments. Correspondingly, it rendered Prince Luitpold's work easier.

FATE SAVES BARTENDER.

Outright Attempt to Kill Pendleton
Man Stopped by Fate Alone.

Only the one chance in a thousand prevented Unatilla from being the scene of another murder the other night when Jim Roach, a transient, fired one shot at a bartender in one of the drink emporiums of that place, stuck his revolver in the pit of the dispenser's stomach for a second shot, pulled the trigger but was foiled in his attempt when the cartridge failed to explode, says the Pendleton Live Wire. Before he had time to pull the trigger again, a blow from a bystander had knocked him down and his weapon had been wrested from his grasp.

Roach had entered the saloon and ordered a drink but had refused to pay for it. Thereupon, the bartender advised him not to ask for anything further. An argument ensued and while the bartender was stooping to wash some glasses, the stranger drew a .38 calibre revolver, leveled it at the head of the bartender and drew, the bullet barely missing the stooping man. As the latter straightened up, Roach thrust the muzzle of his gun against the stomach of his intended victim and pulled the trigger. There was a click and then the would-be murderer was felled with a blow to the jaw. He was arrested and brought to the county jail by Marshall Jeff Stevens and is now awaiting a preliminary hearing.

Sheriff Taylor has the gun, the empty cartridge and the cartridge which failed to explode, as evidence. The cap in the latter is dented where the hammer hit it and had it not have been one of the very few that fail to explode properly, Roach would now be facing a charge of murder.

BANK ROBBERY RUINED.

Said Paroled Convict Can Throw Light
on Big Robbery.

San Francisco, Oct. 25.—Information which may lead to the arrest of one of the gang of five men who dynamited the New Westminster bank and escaped with \$258,000 will be given out in Portland, according to Oscar Jackson, a promoter, who is here enroute to Portland in the custody of an officer. Jackson violated his parole in Oregon and was caught in Los Angeles. If granted immunity, he says he will give the names of the yeggs, who, he said, outlined the plan to him in Portland.

The police say Jackson's story is a fabrication and don't believe it.
