BIG FLOUR ORDER PLACED.

Lostine Mill Called Upon to Supply La
Grande Firm Big Order.

(Lostine Reporter.)

Recognizing the superior product of
the Lostine Milling company, the
Palmer Lumber company of La Grande
has placed an order with this mill for
the delivery of 20 carloads in the
near future. This order amounts to
about 20,000 sacks or an average of
about 1,000 sacks to the car and is
one of the largest orders ever placed
with a mill in Wallowa county. It is
also important in that the mill has
the reputation for the manufacture of
the best flour, holding the gold medal
awarded at the Lewis and Clark fair.
The mill has been running on chop
and mill stuff for some time, but has
commenced on flour beginning this
week, and Mr. Magill states they are
getting in some good wheat now and
will be able to run on full time.

Aside from this order the mill has
shipped considerable flour to W. J.
Funk and the R. S. & Z. company at
Enterprise.

They also recently sent a shipment
to the new store at Minam.

The mill when running steady has a
daily capacity of 100 barrels. On Mon-
day they made a run on graham. At
present the company is feeding about
100 head of hogs but expect to in-
crease this number soon to 250 or
more. Last week a car of hogs which
Fred Fitzpatrick was shipping was
completed with stock from the mill
pens and shipped to Portland.
