IMPROVEMENTS AT LOSTINE.

Lostine Reports Building Activity Near O.-W. Depot Grounds.

There is much substantial improvement in the way of new buildings now under way and more in contemplation near the depot, says the Lostine paper. F. O. Clarke has just finished an eight room dwelling for L. P. McCubbins. Mr. Haun has just begun on the foundation of a two-story frame building 40x80 feet, the upper story to be used as a hall and the ground floor of store purposes. Another frame building 40x50 feet will be erected by S. W. Miles. It is also stated that the Lostine Warehouse company of the Episcopal choir were en route to the church for practice last evening, Knowlton in an intoxicated condition, followed them until they entered the church. 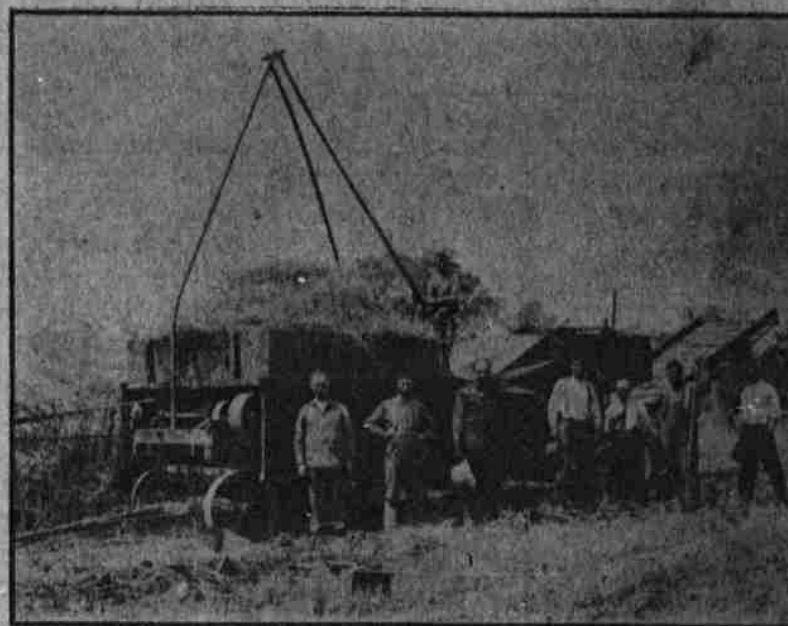
