LEAGUERS AT ELGIN MEETING

SESSIONS LASTING THROUGH THE DAY INTERESTING.

Warm Welcome Given Delegates Last Night—Big Territory Represented.

Elgin, Oct. 27.—(Special)—Principal and remote towns in Wallowa county and all the towns of Union county are represented at a district convention of the Epworth League now under way here.

Last night these delegates, from as

far away as Flora, were greeted by warm addresses of welcome by Attorney Dixon of Elgin, Rev. Trueblood and Mayor Weatherspoon of Elgin. To these, Dr. Gillilan responded for the visitors.

This morning at 6:30 the first session was held, and though early, 20 delegates were up and present. These services led off with an address by Rev. Dressler of Imbler, followed by a paper on temperance by Alpha Christy of Joseph, and Rev. B. F. Meredith of Enterprise on "The Standard of Giving."

During the forenoon other fine numbers were heard, such as one by Miss Fanny McKenna of Union; Mrs. H. C. Vinacke of La Grande, on "How to visit," Mrs. Playle of Alcega on "Home Social Life and League Social Life;" Rev. Cossell of Cove on "Opportuni-

ty;" A. W. James of Wallowa on "Welding," and W. S. Miller of Flora on "Making Good."

Tonight there will be much interest attached to an illustrated lecture on Holy Land, Egypt and Turkey by John Lewtress of Tacoma who has just returned from the Orient.

Call Issued to Woolmen.

To members and all others engaged in the wool and sheep industry:

Call is hereby made for the 14th annual convention of the Oregon Wool Growers' association to be held at Baker City, Oregon on Tuesday and Wed-

nesday, Nov. 14 and 15, 1911.

The O.-W. R. & N. Co. have granted a 1-1-3 fare for round trip ticket. Be sure and get a receipt for ticket going to the convention; this will entitle you to 1-3 fare for ticket returning.

Never in the history of this association have we been confronted with more serious problems. The special session of congress attempted to slaughter the tariff on wool. There is no question but a similar attempt will be made by congress this winter to reduce the duty on wool to a minimum or place it on the free list. We must vigorously conduct the hardest fight ever made in order to educate and convince congress and the American people that our industry is entitled to the same measure of protection as is given the products of any other kind of labor. We must insist before congress that the wool grower is entitled to a tariff on wool that he may realize from his business the actual expenses of operation, plus a reasonable profit, in order that he may live and not be forced into bankruptcy. President Taft vetoed all wool tariff legislation until the tariff board reports in December. We must get ready for the soon coming struggle which will mean the prosperity or ruin of the sheep business.

Some of the questions before the convention will be:

Wool tariff, railroad rates on sheep and wool, railway service on live stock, quarantine and control of contagious diseases, forest reserve grievances, scalp bounty law, wool sales and wool markets, mutton markets, sheep killing outrages.

There will be an interesting business program of the most able and expert speakers on subjects vital to the industry.

The Baker Commercial club and citizens of that energetic town are making elaborate plans for our entertainment and are leaving nothing undone to make this meeting a most enjoyable and momentous occasion; several spicy entertainments have been arranged, including a sumptuous banquet; this promises to be the greatest convention of the association, and that in itself is enough to bring every wool grower in Oregon to the meeting.

Please give your association duties series and urgent consideration. Come and participate and be a part of this convention. Bring your friends.
