ber, the O-W. has computed its amount of freight handled and finds that 2,000 tons more of freight were moved this month than in October of 1910. They point out that the trains have been run almost with the same degree of regularity as before the strike and notwithstanding that the strike has been in existence all the month, there has been no falling off in business as compared to the same month last year; rather, a substantial increase.

Men Are Refused Work.
Strikebreakers have been denied jobs, it is said, because the company is able to do its work with an 80 per cent force as compared to a 100 per cent force that was worked on the short hour basis prior to the strike.

That the strike was ill-timed, and some of the issues fought for unpopular with the public, is deemed by students of the strike to be responsible for the lack of public sympathy with the strikers. Be that as it may, the officials admit that as far as they are concerned there are no ill effects of the strike now.

It is doubtful now, believed those close to affairs, that many of the strikers could get work now if they
