ARBITRATION IS GIVEN RIDICULE

ROOSEVELT DISAPPROVES OF TAFT'S THEORIES.

Says It Would Be Foolish and Wicked
to Arbitrate in All Things.

New York, Nov. 2.—In a signed Out-
look editorial Theodore Roosevelt to-
day goes on record as disapproving
settlement by arbitration of all dis-
puted questions including those af-
fecting the national honor as Pres.
Taft advocated. The editorial says:

"It would be foolish and wicked for
us as a nation to agree to arbitrate
disputes affecting our vital interests,
independence or honor."

Then he quotes historical instances
showing that today and in the past
the pacifying step resulted in loss to
the nations.

The Case of Agrippina.

Professional poisoners arose early in
our era. It is recorded that Agrippina
(A. D. 23) refused to eat apples at the
table of her father-in-law, Tiberius,
through fear of poison. The notorious
Locusta flourished in that epoch. It
is charged that she supplied with ap-
propriate directions the poison by
which Agrippina rid herself of Clau-
dine. She also furnished the poison
that was administered to Britannicus
by order of Nero. This crime was
committed in quite a conventional
manner. The Romans were accus-
tomed to drink hot water at table, but
the same temperature did not appeal to
all. A slave offered hot water to Brit-
annicus. "Too hot," he remarked.
The slave added cold water. Britan-
nicus drank, gasped once or twice and
died. The cold water was poisoned
either with a cyanide or with prussic
acid.

THE LOST ATLANTIS.

Fate of the Continental Island as Told
by the Ancients.

"The Lost Atlantis" is a favorite
subject of song and story, and even
now strange tales are told by sailors
who claim to have seen a great white
city rearing its domes and minarets
up through the green of the sea.

Atlantis was a continental island be-
tween Europe and America. Solon as
long ago as 600 B. C. learned the sto-
ry in Egypt, and it is from him and
later from Plato that the tale has been
handed down to modern peoples.

Atlantis was reigned over by three
kings of marvellous power, and the in-
habitants were a warlike people far
advanced in civilization. The three
kings finally became so puffed with
power that they united forces and
planned a descent on Europe, the pur-
pose of which was to destroy and en-
slave. The Athenians met the in-
vaders and after a fearful battle gained
a decisive victory.

Two days later mighty earthquakes
shook the earth, and tremendous inun-
dations came. When peace succeeded
elemental turmoil the sea stretched
where once had been Atlantis.

A Quicker Process.

A story is told of a certain famous
inventor who is fortunate enough to
be able to employ a large staff of en-
gineers and mathematicians to aid him
in the solution of knotty problems.
Some time ago the inventor desired to
find the cubic capacity of a certain ves-
sel of unsymmetrical proportions and
asked his mathematicians to solve the
problem. As the story goes, the mathe-
maticians spent weeks of time, filled
whole books with their calculations
and finally presented what they said
was a close approximation to the true
result. Thereupon the famous inven-
tor placed the vessel on a platform
scale, filled it to the brim with water,
obtained its weight when full and
when empty, and in a few minutes he
had a result as good as the mathe-
maticians—for that particular vessel.—

Cardinal Lays Cornerstone of College Hall Named For Himself

BROUGHT together by the desire to pay honor to Cardinal Gibbons,
head of the Roman Catholic hierarchy in the United States, the recent
assemblage of archbishops, bishops and priests in Washington was
one of the largest and most distinguished ever seen in America. The
occasion was the laying of the cornerstone of the Gibbons Memorial Hall of
the Catholic University of America, in commemoration of the fiftieth anniver-
sary of the entrance of Cardinal Gibbons into the priesthood and the twenty-
fifth anniversary of his elevation to the cardinalate. The picture shows Car-
dinal Gibbons, wearing his miter, presiding at the ceremonies of the laying of
the stone. The west wing of the memorial hall has been completed, and the
cornerstone occupies a place in the wall of the central tower. Thus far about
\$120,000 has been received for the fund for the building of the hall. A cam-
paign to raise the rest of the \$250,000 needed will be carried on this winter.
