CHINESE IS GOOD SINGER.

Tour of Glee Club Through Oregon to Star Chinese.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Ore., Nov. 2.—(Special)—Harry Ding, a Chinese student at the university, will be the star performer on the 14th annual tour of the University of Oregon glee club, which is to take place during the holidays. Ding will appear in his native costume and sing a few solos, both in Chinese and in English. He has an excellent second bass voice which is surprising for a Chinaman. This is Ding's second season on the glee club. Last year he and his partner, William Lai, made such a hit in the concert at Portland, that a representative of the Orpheum offered the two of them the salary of \$200 a week, if they would go on the Orpheum circuit. The two Chinese students, however, took life too seriously to accept a position in vaudeville.

Harry Ding is one of four or five hundred Chinese students in American colleges, who are studying engineering, with a view of aiding in the development of China. Ding's circumstances are somewhat different from his fellow Chinese students, as he was born and raised in Portland, Oregon. In fact, he has never set foot in the Flowery Kingdom. However, he has an intense loyalty to China, and expects to go there as soon as he finishes his collegiate course. Although raised in Oregon, Mr. Ding never spoke the English language until he was fourteen years old, as his family used the Chinese entirely at home, and all his playmates were of his race. On account of this lack of early training, he finds English to be his hardest course.

UP AND DOWN GRADUATION NOT FELT LOCALLY.

Sugar War in Portland May Reduce Sugar Prices Gace More.

Hogs took an advance of five cents in Portland yesterday, following the decline of the day before, and it is believed that the last quotation will not stand long for the see-saw has started. Local dealers anticipate that the change in Portland is only for a day or two, as they have not been quoted any different prices than prevailed last week.

The sugar war in Portland threatens to lower sugar prices even more than the fall yesterday and it would not be surprising to get lower quotations in La Grande soon. The war seems to be for the bitter end.

PENROSE AFTER ENDOWMENT

Work Falls on President's Shoulders After Hendrick Quits.

Walla Walla, Wash., Nov. 2.—(Special)—By reason of the resignation of Dean Hendrick, the task of completing the Greater Whitman Endowment fund has fallen upon President Penrose, and he is now actively engaged in carrying out that work. It is certain that the city of Walla Walla and vicinity will, as before, take a profound interest in this and bear a considerable part of the burden of supporting the work. A committee, composed of the most prominent men of the city, has been appointed by Mr. Kellough, president of the Commercial club. There is every reason to expect hearty support from some of the large farmers of Walla Walla county who have not yet contributed.

WILD SILKWORMS.

They Weave Their Thread in Skins Inside Their Huge Nests.

The world is indebted to the Chinese for the discovery of the virtues of the silkworm. Its product was unknown in Rome until the time of Julius Caesar, and so costly was the material that even the Emperor Aurelian refused a dress of this lustrous fabric to his empress. Now it is nurtured in almost every country, and its products are within the reach of all.

Besides the several domesticated species, there is a wild silkworm found in Central America which weaves a baglike structure two feet in depth that hangs from the trees. At a distance the nest resembles a huge matted cobweb. The insect makes no cocoon, but weaves the silk in layers and skins around the inside of the nest. From Tegucigalpa there were sent to England some years ago about six pounds of this silk. There it was made into handkerchiefs not easily detected from common silk of equal strength and delicate texture.

There is a curious silk producing spider in Central America, the arann de seda, which may be seen hurrying along with a load of fine silk on its back, from which trail numerous delicate filaments.—Harper's Weekly.
