COUNCIL ACTIVE AT ITS MEETING

FIRST MEETING OF MONTH IS IM-
PORTANT ONE.

Money Budget of Bills Read—Other
Matters of Importance up.

Many affairs of prominence, includ-
ing the final acceptance of the main
sewer line constructed by B. S. Davis,
were transacted last night by the city
council. Davis was ordered paid in
full on the strength of reports from
the engineer and inspectors.

Mayor Richardson, City Recorder
Humphreys, City Attorney Cochran,
all councilmen—Davis, Orvis, Log-
sdon, Church, Mackay, Dunn, Fleming,
and Finley, and heads of departments
were present at the meeting which
was the regular meeting for Novem-
ber.

Prayers of citizens on Second and
O streets for a fire hydrant were
granted.

The improvement of V avenue from
Spruce to the city limits by building
board sidewalks was reported favor-
ably and it will be carried out.

The ordinance covering the accept-
ance of the south half of Lake avenue
was reported in and passed.

The engineer's report on the macad-
amizing of North Second street was
read.

Rebate Is Denied.

The petition for a rebate to prop-
erty owners on East Adams avenue,
because they claimed the Mars maca-
dam was not placed as per contract,
was denied when the committee to
which the petition was referred some
time ago, was reported out and adopt-
ed. The property owners say the
work was not up to standard in sev-
eral instances.

The report of officers for the past
month showed each department has
been active and much work carried
out. The water department, the sewer
project and street department all
reported good progress. The city re-
corder reported \$1,346.50 collected for
water rent, \$228 collected for fines
and \$92.50 for licenses.

Petitioners living on Grandy ave-
nue ask for board sidewalk on cer-
tain sections. This was referred to a
committee.

Liquor License Asked For.

Frank Brown and S. D. Greenhall
seek to have the saloon license now
held by J. F. O'Connell transferred to
them. Mr. O'Connell asks for the
change and the request is accompan-
ied by the necessary bonds. The mat-
ter was referred to the judiciary com-
mittee.

The budget of monthly bills was
read.

The council was deemed to have
jurisdiction on Spring avenue and
the recorder was instructed to adver-
tise for bids for the construction of
the sidewalks.

W. B. Sargent representing J. H.
Peare appeared to take up the matter
of arbitrating the loss sustained by
Mr. Peare when his property was
fenced in by the sewer. Mr. Church
represents the city. They two were
to name a third man but it appears
it is hard to reach an agreement. Mr.
Sargent proposed the council act as
a whole. He suggested the city take
over the tract which Mr. Peare will
sell for \$1,700, whereas he asks \$1,000
as damages. Action will be taken
next week.

Crossing Is Dangerous.

The fence around the O-W. depot
started a movement, long discussed
in a roundabout way, when Council-
man Logsdon brought up the situa-
tion. He says the fence shuts off the
view of the track on North Fir in
such a way that pedestrians cannot
see if a train is approaching. Mr.
Logsdon says the situation is danger-
ous. Mayor Richardson voiced the
need of an alarm bell being placed
there. This would prevent an acci-
dent. The travel is heavy there and
with no alarm or watchman the situa-
tion is said to be becoming very ser-
ious. A bell or a flagman was deem-
ed the best plan, it was thought. No
final action was taken as the council
adjourned but the Fourth ward is up
in arms. If Mr. Logsdon is correctly
advised.

BAKER SHAKEN BY CANNON.

Pendleton Has Noisy Celebration and
Arrests Follow Franks.

Baker, Ore., Oct. 31.—(Special)—
The Columbia cannon recently secur-
ed from the government and placed on
the court house lawn as a memorial to
Colonel Edward Dickson Baker
was fired by Halloween miscreants at
midnight with disastrous results.
Court house windows were smashed
and buildings for blocks around suf-
fered.

The Baker Chinese colony is in a
turmoil over the theft of an image of
Buddha taken from the temple. The
statue is six feet high and was hauled
up by ropes through a hole cut in the
roof.

What might have proved a Hal-
loween prank with serious conse-
quences was prevented last night by
the vigilance of Officer Ira Hughes,
who patrolled the east end of the city.
Shortly after 8 o'clock he discovered
a hand car placed on the O-W. R. &
N. track by a gang of boys, which, if
it had not been removed, would un-
doubtedly have caused a wreck. Of-

icer Hughes did not content himself
with undoing the boys' work but he
made a search and captured the
gang responsible, took their names
and ordered them to report before
John Halley, juvenile officer, Satur-
day. The gang was then dispersed
and peaceful in the east end of the
city. This crowd did more serious
damage than any other last night,
nearly all of the complaints coming
from the zone of their operations.
