FANCY APPLES STILL POPULAR

NO CHANGE IN APPLE MARKET CONDITIONS.

Same Slow Demand for Medocre Stuff and Spirited Call for Fancies

(By Northwestern Fruit Exchange.)

Portland, Nov. 2.—(Special) — The market continues exceedingly strong for strictly fancy fruit, in desirable varieties and assortments, of large sizes. Three and a half tier is the popular size, with four tier next, and for these sizes the demand is greater than the exchange can begin to supply—having sold out, in advance of shipment, practically the entire output all varieties of the Cashmere Fruit Growers' union, and its other members in the Cashmere-Wenatchee district, which is one of the few districts in the northwestern states this year producing the character of fruit that is in demand. Accordingly the exchange is obliged every day to refuse orders from all directions for the simple reason that it cannot supply the fruit. The exchange has effected a tremendously wide distribution again this year; its pre-season campaign was inaugurated long in advance of crop maturity when it was thought that the supply would be very much larger than it proved to be, and for that reason, a demand has been created that cannot be supplied. This is fortunate for exchange members for it has enabled the exchange to push prices to the extreme limits, and also to confine its sales to the most select class of trade.

The other side of the situation is the absence of demand for medium to poor grades and small sizes. Cars containing miscellaneous mixtures, of varieties, small sizes, are very hard to move at any price. Of such fruit, the eastern and middle western districts have a large supply of their own, and are not buying the same kind from the west, with its high cost of freight.

So the market may be sharply summarized: Heavy demand and high prices for standard varieties, first

class quality and pack and large sizes. No demand or rather, only nominal demand for anything not coming up to this description, with correspondingly low prices.
