These will include a number of royalists whose demonstrations for Reyes, Madero's opponent at the polls—were too enthusiastic. With Gomez exiled Madero expects to be rid of his more dangerous political enemies.

FORDICEN CITY FELL

Scials are reported to have fled from Peking.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 6.—Cables received here today state that rebels captured Peking yesterday after 12 hours of fighting. It is reported that after the street fighting, the Manchu princes fled from the city. It is believed the city fell without much bloodshed.

Stability Behind Organization.

Shanghai, Nov. 6.—Permanence and stability for the new Chinese provisional government is proposed by Li Yuan Hong, recently proclaimed president, is indicated today with the announcement that Wu Ting Fang, former minister to the United States, has accepted the post of foreign secretary under the new regime.

This, it is believed, shows that the Manchu dynasty is sure to fall.

Rebels demand the deposition of the boy emperor and degradation of his rank to a commoner and a republican form of government, the president to be elected by a public election.

Peking is reported in a state of anarchy. Admiral Winslow commanding the British naval forces today advised England to send troops to China as he fears grave disorders will accompany the Manchu overthrow. It is understood he has suggested that other countries send 1,500 soldier each immediately.

Emperor to Leave.

Tien Tsing, Nov. 6.—It is rumored that the child emperor is preparing a hasty flight to Cheng Te in northern Manchuria. Rebels at Shanghai endorse Li's refusal to accept anything less than a republican government as fruit of the revolution.

Crews of three of Admiral Sah's gunboats today placed their boats at the rebels' disposal here. The remainder of the fleet is expected soon to fall into rebel hands as the vessels are almost out of ammunition with no prospects of getting more.

Second Team Defeated.

With many first team men in the second team lineup, the high school regulars were able to score a touchdown on the scrubs at the practice game last Saturday. The second team men fought grittily but the regulars unrelentingly scored substantial forward passes and long runs.

To Observe Tippecanoe Centennial.

Lafayette, Ind., Nov. 6.—Great preparations have been completed for tomorrow's celebration of the centennial of the battle of Tippecanoe, in which the little frontier army under William Henry Harrison defeated the Indians under Chief Tecumseh. The celebration will be held on the battlefield near this city and will consist of a reproduction of the battle, together with addresses by Governor Marshall and others.
