COUNCIL PUTS ISSUE TO VOTE

REIMBURSEMENT OF FORMER CITY TREASURER REQUESTED

Petition Liberally Signed—Mr. Wright Last of Three Who Lost.

Taxpayers of La Grande will be given an opportunity to reimburse the third and last party to lose public moneys in the failure of the Farmers & Traders National bank.

On the strength of a petition signed by a large number of taxpayers, the city council last night determined to place on the ballot for the coming municipal election the question of reimbursing J. K. Wright, formerly treasurer of the city of La Grande, for money lost in the bank crash. The petition sets forth that in view of the fact that the school district reimbursed A. C. Williams and the legislature ordered Treasurer Frawley and Sheriff Childers reimbursed it is only meet and just that Mr. Wright should be reimbursed as well. The question will be put to a public vote December 11 at which time the municipal election is held.

Surrender's Proof of Claim.

In the event that the voters order the reimbursement of Mr. Wright, the latter will surrender to the city his proof of claims and any subsequent dividends that might be issued from the government will then go to the city direct. Mr. Wright paid every cent lost back to the treasurer immediately after the failure of the institution. This sum amounted to \$3,482.38. The first dividend reduced the total sum \$1,567.07 and the second dividend issued by the government was for \$384.24. There is left, therefore, a total of \$1,567.07 which Mr. Wright is losing because he was a public official and could in no wise be blamed for the loss. The city, however, has at no time been "out" for the city treasurer was reimbursed immediately and what dividends have been paid by the government have went to Mr. Wright. The petition urging the placing of this question on the ballot was large.

DRYS WIN IN RICHLAND.

Many Interior Towns Take Vote on Liquor Question.

Halfway, Nov. 8.—(Special)—At yesterday's local option election there were 44 votes, out of which 28 were for license saloons and 16 for no license. In precinct No. 1 the vote was 48 wet, and 24 dry. Precinct No. 2, 58 votes were cast for license, and 36 against license, a majority in the two precincts of 60 in favor of saloons. Cornucopia, Nov. 8.—(Special)—On four votes were cast in this pre-

dict against licensed saloons, while 58 were cast for the licensed saloon. Richland, Nov. 8.—(Special)—The drays won an overwhelming victory in yesterday's election. The total vote cast was 56, of which 37 voted for no license, and 19 in favor of licensed saloons. The result was a surprise to everyone, as it was thought by both sides that the vote would be close.
