To those who are familiar with the work of Mrs. Dierke, she scarcely needs an introduction. Her reputation is that of a finished artist, and her appearances in concert both here and abroad, where she concertized for a year, have called forth the most enthusiastic applause.

Mrs. Dierke is playing in many cities on the coast this year. She gave a recital at Medford last month and was immediately engaged for a return concert there in the spring. In addition to the two concerts she has recently given in Portland with such flattering success, she gives two guaranteed concerts there in January. In writing of her last recital in Portland the Journal writes:

"Mrs. Dierke accomplished feats of technique that were amazing; freedom, buoyancy, elasticity and precision all being there. The scales were true legato scales, strings of brillants, each one individual, yet never blurring the beauty of its neighbor. The listener marveled at the adaptability of the human hand."

The program here will include the Schumann Carnival, the Magic Fire from Walkure, Arabesques on the Strauss Blue Danube by Schulz-Ealer, and two numbers by Marian Bauer, a Portland girl who is winning laurels in the field of composition. When these two numbers were given in Portland Mrs. Dierke was obliged to repeat them. There will be also a Beethoven number, a Chopin group, and a group representing the modern Russian school.

Mrs. Dierke brings with her a magnificent Steinway Concert Grand piano and it is sincerely to be hoped that La Grande will warmly greet her upon her appearance here.

Mrs. Dierke is a personal friend of Mrs. Eria Carlock, under whose management she gives her concert here, and Mrs. Carlock is leaving nothing undone to insure its success.
